

LeMoynes Theater Workshop Begins Six-Week Program

LeMoynes College Theater Workshop will begin operations June 30 and will continue for six weeks under the direction of Gene McCarthy, veteran LeMoynes dramatic producer and director.

Work will continue from 9:00 a.m. to noon each day, Monday thru Friday.

STUDENTS who desire it and who display sufficient talent will be offered an opportunity to participate in the productions of the Summer Theater before the general public.

The Summer Theater will be operated four nights a week, Monday thru Thursday, on the resident stock company plan with the casts consisting of student players whenever possible, supplemented by experienced players from the Foot & Buskin Dramatic Guild and the LeMoynes Guild Players.

The course will be conducted on the workshop plan of selecting a play, casting, rehearsing, costuming, making-up and acting it, as well as building and painting the scenery and setting the lights for it. The student will be taught "the play" from idea to final curtain.

GENE MCCARTHY brings to the LeMoynes Workshop the experience of thirty years in the theater and more than a hundred productions.

In addition to the student wishing to acquire credits in an interesting and agreeable field, the course has been designed to benefit teachers, non-professional actors, Little Theater Directors, potential playwrights and those who have already achieved some measure of success in the theater.

Radio Links 90,000 In Rites Honoring Sacred Heart

Quebec - (NC) - Ninety thousand persons - 50,000 at Quebec City and 40,000 at Montreal - joined in a tribute to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Linked by radio, while several million "compatriots" listened across Canada, speakers in Quebec and in Montreal took part.

At Quebec, the thousands filled the civic stadium. Among the participants were 4,000 delegates attending the French Language Congress, with representatives from France and the United States.

At Montreal, the vast crowd gathered before the internationally known shrine of St. Joseph's Oratory on the slopes of Mount Royal.

The two ceremonies began at 10 p. m. on the eve of the Feast of the Sacred Heart and each concluded with Midnight Mass.

At Quebec, the Mass was offered by Archbishop Maurice Roy of Quebec; at Montreal, by Archbishop Paul Emile Leger of Montreal.

The act of consecration of all French Canada to the Sacred Heart was read by the Rev. Adrien Verrette, of Plymouth, N. H., president of the French Language Congress, at Quebec.

The first film is a sensational tale about a deaf and dumb welterweight boxer, played by Tony Curtis. The plot revolves around two girls, a gold digger (Jan Sterling) with an eye on the big prizefighter earner, and a genuine little socialite (Mona Freeman) with special sympathy with a boy whose affliction was shared by her dead and much revered father.

Opera Star Dies; Funeral In N. Y.

New York - (NC) - A Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered by the Very Rev. Daniel L. Shannon, O.P., at the Church of St. Vincent Ferrer here for Emma Eames, great soprano at the Metropolitan Opera during its Golden Age at the turn of the century.

A CONVERT to Catholicism, she received the Last Rites of the Church before her death (June 13) at the age of 84. The singer entered the Church about 20 years ago in Paris.

Madame Eames retired from the operatic stage in 1912 after being the toast of two continents in the early 1900's. She graced the Metropolitan in the heyday of the Golden Age and won renown, as well, at French and English opera houses.

AMONG THE 200 present at the Mass were Gov. John Davis Lodge of Connecticut and his wife. Gov. Lodge was a close friend of the late singer. Also in the congregation were Edward Johnson, former general manager of the "Met," and the Duchess de Richelieu.
