### Msgr. Cameron's Will Leaves Sums To Church Units

Sums of \$5,000 to St. Bernard's Seminary and of \$1,200 to Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester, of which he was pastor, were bequeathed by the Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, probate of his will before Surrogate G. Robert Wilmer disclosed Monday.

Msgr. Cameron, 70, died May 3 aboard a ship en route to the Eucharistic Congress in Barcelona, Spain. His estate, all in personal property, was estimated at more than \$10,000. Under the will, made in August, 1949, the Rev. George S. Wood, assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, and Attorney David H. Shearer were appointed executors. Shearer appeared for the estate.

OF THE REQUEST to Immaculate Conception Church, \$200 was for Masses. Msgr. Cameron also left \$300 to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, of which \$40 is an offering for a perpetual membership and \$260 is for Masses.

To St. Andrew's Seminary, Msgr. Cameron left his library of 100 books or more, as it may see fit. To the three assistant pastors of Immaculate Conception Church, he bequeathed \$100 each. To his cook, his housekeeper and his secretary he gave \$50 each.

Mrs. Sarah Cameron, 50 Edmonds St., wife of a brother, William J. Cameron, was willed \$1,000.

The remainder of the estate was left equally to two sisters, Mrs. Anne Robinson and Mrs. Mary C. Lally, both of Cambridge, N. Y., and two brothers, John A. Cameron, Glendale, Calif., and the Rev. Ignatius X. Cameron, administrator of St. Mary's of the Lake Church, Ontario, N. Y. Personal effects and jewelry were left specifically to Father Cameron.
