

Gen. Chennault Recalls Nuns, Orphans Rescue, Urge China Recovery

Los Angeles — (NC) — Forgetting the hazards of the situation, General Claire Lee Chennault chucked as he recalled how the air evacuation of five nuns, 40 orphans and two Jersey cows from the path of advancing communists in China.

"That was quite a picturesque bit of logistics," the General said. "The Sisters and orphans on each side of the plane, the cows in the middle. We got the whole bunch to another area with one of our planes. The nuns had raised the animals from the time they were calves for milk for the young-stocks."

THE ENEMY left the weather-beaten face as the General recalled:

"It didn't do too much good, though. The group was overrun by the Reds at the next base."

General Chennault came here for a reunion of the famous Flying Tigers group he headed in China in pre-World War II days. In an exclusive interview with The Tidings Los Angeles archdiocese newspaper, the General discussed the gravity of world affairs and gave his views on the China situation.

He said he was impressed highly by the great work Catholic priests and nuns had made in China.

"These missionaries were instrumental in saving many of course there's nothing left. The Red communists will have taken over now and their Christianity and Buddhism will have been purged well wiped out in China."

The General contends that the United States has placed too much stress on the defense of western Europe and has become vulnerable in other strategic areas of the world, particularly in Asia.

American foreign policy is "not too realistic enough," he declared. When asked about the present state of China, the General said it is "definitely lost" to the western democracies. He expressed the belief that the United States by pouring money into the Army National Guard against the Soviet Union, has not solved throughout the world.

"WE HAVE TO analyze the enemies we're trying to stop," General Chennault said. "We're not sure whether or not they are communists — we just hope they are. As a result we might be attacking countries.

"Look at Korea and Turkey and Greece," he continued. "They've stopped the Reds in Korea. The Greeks are good enough now to stop some of the Communists. Some for the Turks. Turkey is one of the strongest anti-communist nations today. There would be hard to find in a very honest of the propaganda, but again, it's a strong anti-communist country."

General Chennault indicated he wasn't particularly interested in the possibility of the U.S. Troops. No comment. "I don't

know I just don't go for it."

AS TO THE future, the General said:

"We've got to get China back somehow if we want to stay in the Orient. Lenin recognized the power of China. So did Stalin. We didn't. The only way to get China back is to support in every way the Nationalists under Chiang Kai Shek. Any other trooper besides Chinese would have a chance on the mainland. The Japanese tried for eight years and got nowhere."

"As soon as the Nationalists could hit China in force," he said, "you would see the same thing happen that has happened in Korea; thousands of Red soldiers would defect to the Nationalists. The General grimmed again and commented: "There's one thing you can say about the communists anywhere: they'll renounce communism in a second if they think they have a chance of getting away with it."

Pope Pius Writes Letter To Mother Of Girl Saint

Vatican City — (NC) — Mamma Assunta Goretti found the "proven instruments of a Christian education equal to all trials."

She received this tribute from Pope Pius XII in a special letter sent to her on the 50th anniversary of the death of her daughter, St. Maria Goretti, who died in defense of her chastity.

THE POPE TOLD Mrs. Goretti that these "proven instruments" were "holy fees of God, daily prayer and the exercise of the domestic virtues."

The Pontiff sent the remem-

brance of his " paternal consideration" to Mrs. Goretti as ceremonies commemorating St. Maria's "martyrdom for purity" were held in Corinaldo, Netuno and Ferriere.

Mrs. Goretti wanted to go to Netuno where the death of her daughter occurred. But 86-year-old "Mamma Assunta" who has been an invalid for eight years, was dissuaded from making the journey. It would have been a 500-mile, roundtrip journey from her home at Corinaldo.

THE POPE'S MESSAGE said:

"Grateful to God who in such manner comforts the Church in the alternating vicissitudes of her stern pilgrimage . . . it pleases us to point out once more to our sons and daughters, young and old, and particularly to feminine youth as the most assailed by the world and Satan, the name and examples of this virgin martyr whom God prepared as a shining model in our day, whom you protected as a lily among thorns."

"To this world, which although it does sense the superhuman beauty of Christian virtue as it triumphs over evil, sex and age, this unconquered martyr shows of what things weakness is capable when Grace strengthens it and how the shortest life, when Christ fills it, is light and wisdom in the midst of the shadow and darkness of a world that is corrupt and corrupting, and an irresistible invitation to virtue . . .

"Our thoughtful memory cannot fail to associate you, fortunate mother, with your innocent child as obeying the spirit of God, Friend of the humble. Helped by poverty and the arduous Calvary of life, you found in holy fear of God, daily prayer and the exercise of the domestic virtues the proven instruments of a Christian education equal to all trials, ready for all sacrifices and trained for all battles with the spirit of evil."
