**Nazareth Class To Study At Elmira Hospital**

A new class of nursing students from Nazareth College, Rochester, have begun their affiliation at St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, Elmira. These students entered the college September, 1951, and have completed one year of study at the college.

The students will be at St. Joseph's for thirteen months. During this summer their course includes theory and laboratory practice in nursing arts and nutrition as well as supervised hospital practice.

Beginning in September, they will have their theory and practice in medical and surgical nursing, operating room, obstetrics, and dietetic laboratory at St. Joseph's.

Upon completion of this work at the Elmira hospital, the Nazareth students will have affiliation in psychiatric nursing at Willard State Hospital, Willard, the nursing of children at Syracuse Memorial Hospital, Syracuse, tuberculosis nursing at Elgin Memorial Hospital, Ithaca, and experience with the Visiting Nurse Association of Rochester.

The entire course is four years in length and the final year is spent at the college. At graduation, the students will receive a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from the college and will be eligible for licensure by New York State as registered professional nurses.

Both Nazareth College School of Nursing and St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing have recently received approval by the National Nursing Accrediting Service.

This is an agency set up on 1949 to accredit both collegiate and basic three-year hospital nursing schools on a nation-wide basis.

**New School To Rise At St. Joseph Nuns' Mission**

A new St. Elizabeth's School building will be constructed in Selma, Alabama following ground breaking ceremonies conducted last week, according to the Fathers of St. Edmund missionaries working among the Colored in Alabama and North Carolina.

THE SCHOOL is supervised by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester. The new building will have four large classrooms and two offices. The face will be of venter brick and the interior walls will be painted concrete block.

Great expanse of windows will allow full daylight all day. The grounds are 300 x 500 feet giving ample space for building and recreational facilities.

FOR THE PAST 14 years, the school was in an old frame building. The first class consisted of five students. The number had increased to 120 in June 1951. As a result of overcrowded conditions for the past two years on the Edmundite missions, the parish hall of St. Elizabeth's was converted for teaching purposes. The new school will fulfill a long desired need in their mission field, the missionaries said. Friends from all over the United States are responsible for the much needed project, the Fathers stated.

SISTER Vincenzina of Rochester, Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph in Selma, dug the first shovel of dirt on the site for the new building with Very Rev. Norman E. Lambert, S.S.E., Mission Director for the Fathers of St. Edmund, assisting.

On hand for the ceremony were both white and colored friends of the mission.

Also taking part were the Rev. Nelson E. Zitz, S.S.E. and the Rev. Anne Trahan, S.S.E. Sister Philomena, Sister Dominic, Sister Alonzo and Sister Francis David of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The Sisters of St. Joseph took over their work in the Selma mission after the first group left Rochester in Sept. 1940. The Sisters took charge of the hospital there in June, 1944.

Miss Peter who died Feb. 19, 1952, and a resident of St. Ann's Home at the time, bequeathed \$300 to a cousin, the Rev. Louis Klein, S.J., of Sacred Heart College, Madras District, India.

**Trappists Given Blacksmith Shop**

Machinery and equipment of the Crowley Brothers Blacksmith Shop, Redman Corners, Clarkson, has been donated to the Monastery of Our Lady of Christ the King of the Genesee, Pittard, by Miss Catherine M. Crowley of Clarkson. It was announced in that village.

The Crowley shop was opened some 60 years ago by John Crowley, then 15 years of age, and conducted by him and his brother, James Crowley, until their deaths in 1934 and 1951. The shop has long been a landmark in the area and has served the farmers over a large area.

The Monastery is conducted by the monks of the Order of Clerics of the Strict Observance better known as "The Trappists." The Trappists are establishing a farm in connection with the monastery.

Charles B. Gottry of the Sam Gottry Carling Company and the William E. Duffy Carling Company have trucked many things for the Monastery. It is believed that a carling company will also transfer the blacksmith shop and machinery from Catherine Crowley to the Monastery.

Miss Crowley is a cousin of the Rev. Arthur T. O'Brien, administrator of St. Joseph's Church, Westington, South Dakota.

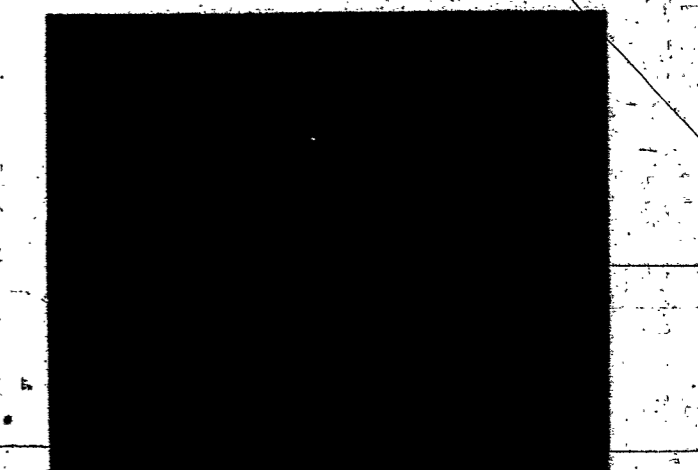
**St. Anne Novena At Holy Family**
