

Father Beyma, U.S. War Chaplain Dies Suddenly

The Rev. (Capt.) Vincent J. Beyma, who went along for the ride with a fellow hospital patient to watch a police lineup at Arlington, Va., collapsed during the lineup and died July 11, 1952, a short time later.

Father Beyma of Scranton died at the age of 42 and a half years. He was a chaplain at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Canandaigua, leaving there Sept. 8, 1948, to return to active duty with the U. S. Army Chaplain Corps.

He was a patient at Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C. He had a second heart attack, which led to a holding by two hitchhikers, who went to the Arlington jail to try to identify the youths who robbed him.

The 46-year-old priest was stationed at Fort Monmouth, N. J. He was admitted to Walter Reed Hospital as a heart patient in May. Father Beyma was a World War II veteran.

At the lineup, the holding victim was unable to identify any of the prisoners.

Chaplain Beyma is survived by his father, Andrew Beyma who resides at 37 Richard St., Rochester; a brother, A. Joseph Beyma; and two sisters, Mrs. Martha Whitney and Mrs. Helen Klingler. Funeral was held in Pittston, Pa.
