

Devotion To St. Anne Urged In Elmira Parish Bulletin

Parishioners of St. Peter and Paul's Church, Elmira are directed to special devotion to St. Anne, mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in preparation for the Feast on July 26 in "The Chimes," parish publication.

The paper notes that millions of Catholics in the world will be attending Masses and visiting shrines in preparation for the Feast.

"If you are interested in honoring St. Anne and perhaps benefiting by her powerful intercession, but find it impossible to visit any of her famous shrines you might consider the following suggestion," the article said.

"IF YOU BEGIN a private novena of Masses or special prayers on Friday of this week (July 18) you will complete on the feast-day itself (July 26).

"As an aid to your devotion you might kneel before the beautiful statue of St. Anne which you will find on the gospel side of our church and recite the rosary of her daughter, Mary, or any other special prayers you choose. (Several novena booklets in honor of St. Anne will be found on our pamphlet stand).

"At least try to stop in church each day beginning Friday of this week and recite a few Hail Marys in her honor. Good St. Anne will graciously reward you," the article concluded.

The boys planned to receive Holy Communion each Sunday of the trip as they assist at Mass in complete uniform wherever they may reach. They will tell the parish priest where they are from and what they plan to do on the next Sunday.

Their trip took them to North Bay, north of Toronto and westward to Sault Ste. Marie, then they will go to Yellowstone National Park. On the return trip they will have a day of sightseeing in Chicago.

THE BOYS have been planning this trip for a year. They have earned funds by selling newspapers and candy, some worked as pinboys. Estimated cost of the trip is \$150, a piece.

The boys took four two-man tents, cooking utensils and sleeping bags. They will do most of their own light cooking, but plan on eating some of their dinners out. They will camp at state and national parks or in Scout camps whenever possible.

In the fall, it is planned to begin a cub program in St. Boniface parish which will round out the complete program. The parish has an outstanding Scout troop and Explorer post.

Kidnaped French Priest Released

Jerusalem—(RNS)—A French Catholic priest, Rev. Pierre Guichot, was kidnaped by Syrian soldiers while walking in the demilitarized zone between Israel and Syria, reports here said. He was later released.

The priest, a visitor to Israel, was blindfolded and forcibly removed by two Syrian soldiers who entered Israeli territory in the area of the Jordan River and the Sea of Galilee.

Protests by the Israeli government and the United Nations Mixed Armistice Commission resulted in the release of Father Guichot after two days detention in Syria.

Fr. Hubbard Story Retold On Patton Dying A Catholic

Waverly—The Rev. Bernard J. Hubbard, S.J., the famed "Glacier Priest" is convinced that General Patton died a Catholic according to an article in St. James Church bulletin published by the Rev. G. Stuart Hogan, pastor here.

Entitled "Did General George Patton Die a Catholic?" the article in the July 6 issue said: "DURING WORLD WAR II, General Patton on one occasion asked Father Hubbard, the famous 'Glacier Priest,' if he, although a Protestant, could make a retreat under him using the spiritual exercises of St. Ignatius.

"Father Hubbard was about to leave for America, and before he returned General Patton was riding in a jeep in back of the general. He got out and said, 'Say the prayers of the dying for me.'

"The chaplain said: 'I am a Catholic priest.' The general answered: 'I know it. You are just the man I want say the prayers for the dying.'

"Father Hubbard is convinced that General Patton had baptism of desire, and belongs to the soul of the Church.

The article had a foot note saying "So far as we know, this story has not been published before. It was told this spring by Father Hubbard at Geneva, N.Y."

Father Beyma, U.S. War Chaplain Dies Suddenly

The Rev. (Capt.) Vincent J. Beyma, who went along for the ride with a fellow hospital patient to watch a police lineup at Arlington, Va., collapsed during the lineup and died July 11, 1952, a short time later.

Father Beyma of Scranton diocese was for two and a half years Catholic Chaplain at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Canandaigua, leaving there Sept. 6, 1948, to return to active duty with the U. S. Army Chaplain Corps.

He was a patient at Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C. He had accompanied another patient victim of a holdup by two ruffians, who went to the Arlington jail to try to identify the youths who robbed him.

The 46-year-old priest was stationed at Fort Monmouth, N. J. He was admitted to Walter Reed Hospital as a heart patient in May. Father Beyma was a World War II veteran.

At the lineup, the holdup victim was unable to identify any of the prisoners.

Chaplain Beyma is survived by his father, Andrew Beyma, who resides at 87 Richmond St., Rochester; a brother, A. Joseph Beyma; and two sisters, Mrs. Martha Whitley and Mrs. Helen Klingner. Funeral was held in Pittston, Pa.

Red China Expels 2 Priests, 1 From St. Bernard's Class

Expulsion of the Rev. Maurice Feeney, M.M., of Albany and a member of St. Bernard Seminary's 1930 class and of the Rev. Aloysius Rechsteiner, M.M., of Williamsport, Pa. from Red China leaves only 58 American Catholic missionaries there, according to a NCWC News Service dispatch from Hong Kong.

The two priests arrived in Hong Kong after their expulsion. They had long been prevented from discharging their duties of caring for orphans and for their parishioners at Yeungkong, Kwangtung province.

Expulsion of the two missionaries leaves only eight American Maryknollers in Red China.

It was tipped from the altar. When they could not open the inner steel door they threw it into the street.

The two priests were taken to a building in the Protestant mission compound. After the Reds had ousted Father Rechsteiner from the orphanage, they used threats and blandishments on the 20 blind and crippled girls to have them accuse the priest of "cruelty."

A few months ago a Communist youth broke into the priests' chapel in the Protestant compound and desecrated the tabernacle.

First Ordination Since Reformation

Cologne—(NC)—Bishop Theodor Suhr, O.S.B., Vicar Apostolic of Denmark, has performed the first ordination of a Catholic priest in that country since the Protestant Reformation, according to a Copenhagen report of Klerchlicher Nachrichten dienst, Catholic news agency here.
