This estimate was made by National Center of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, here, which is promoting the observance jointly with the Catholic Biblical Association Association of America.

Hollywood In Focus

Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz aren't going to their studio these days. It's flooded with mail. Seems every body wants to know why they stopped their "I Love Lucy" show through the summer.

"Nothing on TV these Monday evenings, writes one woman. 'Too bad if it's on account of the new baby,' sympathized another.

"I can't write to all these good people," Lucille says, "but I want them to know we think it's wonderful about the baby. Little Lucy Desires is just one year old and our next bundle should be here by New Year's. What's any family show worth without a family anyway?"

Blessings suddenly poured on this couple. They once had fair breaks in films. Then they just coasted. Lucille did a radio program. Out of it grew the "I Love Lucy" television series which they put on film, six weeks ahead of time.

IT WENT like a prairie fire. It has topped the American Research poll in New York for five consecutive months; holds first place on the Hooper poll and rates 72, the highest, on the Los Angeles Telegenic rating. It's well ahead of other popular family shows like Burns and Allen.

The Nelson report months ago showed that 11,055,000 homes see "I Love Lucy" every week. That pans out at over 30,000,000 people a time.

Now the movie people, who didn't think much of Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz, want them back for films.

They just can't turn out enough of this family entertainment which ought to convince the Hollywood movie people that public tastes are on the upbeat and that too many sordid "down-beat" films provide one reason why the movie box-office is so "beat up" these days.

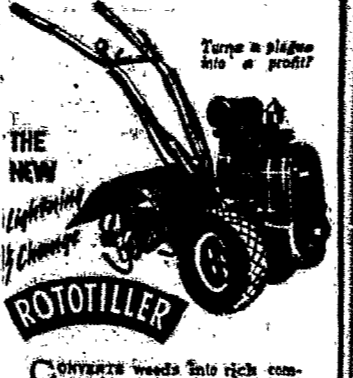
