By FAWN SCHEFFEL. Four Jewish boys who made an appearance in Rochester at the Trilora Hotel not quite a month ago are plugging a song honoring the Blessed Mother.

The Ames brothers—Ed, Vic, Gene and Joe—a quartet popular on stage, radio and television have recorded "Lovely Lady Dressed in Blue" for Coral-Decca records. "Lovely Lady" is a poem written by Mary Dixon Thayer and one frequently quoted by Bishop Fulton J. Sheen. It has been set to music by the Rev. Fred Nelson who says he thinks the Ames brothers do a beautiful job of it. Father Nelson admits writing quite a few songs but he says "they've never amounted to much." This time he's penned a hit it seems for sale of the Ames recording might well surpass the Brothers' best-seller "Undecided" record.

The quartet has been singing together since their grammar school days in Boston and were prize-winners in many amateur contests in that area. Usually they conduct their act with a serious number, sometimes a spiritual. Now, they often use the "Lovely Lady" number for their closing.

Black Out. Presbyterians Block TV Mass in Scotland.

LONDON—(NC)—An inquiry has been ordered here following the "black out" in Scotland of a televised solemn High Mass relayed recently from the Basilica of St. Denis in Paris by the British Broadcasting Corporation.

THE OCCASION marked the first time that a Mass had been televised in Britain. The service was accompanied by a commentary provided by the Rev. Angelus Andrew, O.F.M., Britain's "Radio Priest," and was part of a week's program of French television events sponsored by the BBC.

Officials here said the black-out was the first known instance of a regional center refusing to take a program put over the national television network from London.

According to Melville Dinwiddie, the Scottish regional controller, the decision against televising the program in Scotland was in line with recommendations of local Presbyterian officials. He said that Presbyterian representatives had insisted that the first "communion service" to be televised in Scotland should be a church of Scotland rite.

Mr. Dinwiddie recalled that a Protestant service has already been televised in Scotland, but he said it was not a "communion service."

Incomparable' Hildegarde Finally Locates Poetess

Woburn, Mass.—(NC)—A celebrated singer who feels she prays in song has finally discovered the whereabouts and identity of a poet who has been an inspiration to her. She is a simple housewife, here who feels she prays in poetry.

The story began when Hildegarde Lorey, a better known as the "Incomparable Hildegarde," wrote the story of her career for the June issue of the Catholic Digest. She ended the article by quoting the inspiring poem which she says she carried with her in her Rosary case. She knew the author only as a Ruth M. McKean.

MISS MCKEAN is now Mrs. John J. Kierstead here, the mother of three girls. Before quoting the poem in the Catholic Digest, Hildegarde said: "I've searched in vain for the author, Ruth M. McKean. I hope she will forgive my intrusion of her rights if I share it with others."

As soon as the Digest hit the newsstands friends telephoned Mrs. Kierstead and hold her that "Hildegarde is looking for you." Mrs. Kierstead wrote to Hildegarde in London through the forwarding services of the Catholic Digest. Hildegarde sent back an autographed photo to her favorite poet. The Catholic Digest helped her to make matters right in the Kierstead household by sending Mrs. Kierstead a \$75 check for publication of the poem.

THIS BOOST in her poetic career delighted Mrs. Kierstead and her husband, a laboratory technician, but seven-year-old Jeanie, the second oldest daughter, saw things in a different light.

"Mama's got a check! Mama's got a check!" she exclaimed to neighbors. "We're all going to have lobster sandwiches now!"

Our Lady's Messages To World Listed In Book

Milwaukee, Wis.—(NC)—"The most important story of our time"—how "Our Lady is pleading with us to help her save the world from the terrible results of its own sins"—is told in a new book published here.

"The Woman Shall Conquer," by Don Sharkey, relates in one volume the stories of apparitions and messages of Our Lady from 1830 to the present, a century and a quarter in which the author says it seems certain Our Lady has made more appearances on earth than in any similar period in history. Bruce is the publisher.

ALL WE NEED do is heed the request of Our Lady, and there will be peace," Mr. Sharkey writes, citing the Fatima message. "The solution to the problem of war or peace is in our hands. Our day-to-day actions are more important than all the deliberations of the United Nations. Our Lady is pleading with us to help her save the world from the terrible results of its own sins," he notes. "The very least we can do is read her message. After that, we must act upon it. Nothing is more important," the author adds.

MR. SHARKEY begins with Our Lady's first message in Paris in 1830. They led to the striking of the Miraculous Medal at Our Lady's request. He closes with His Eminence Federico Cardinal Tedeschini's report that His Holiness Pope Pius XII had seen the Fatima Miracle of the Sun repeated four times at the Vatican in 1950. Cardinal Tedeschini is the Archbishop of St. Peter's Basilica.
