Class War Deplored In Pontiff's Address

Castelgandolfo (NC)—In dealing with the labor problem, the objective of the Church is "the overcoming and composing of social differences," not class struggle.

"This was made clear by Pope Pius XII in an address to Italian chaplains assigned to look after the spiritual needs of Italian emigrants to various European countries."

"TELL YOUR Catholic people," the Pope said, "that the Church has always had, and will always have, maternal concern for the workers, and that her action extends to all classes and all conditions."

"The Pope then pointed out that at least in those countries where the chaplains and the emigrants will go," the labor question has long ago passed its first stage. He went on to say: "What 60 or 70 years ago was a goal to be gained for the worker, has since become—with the collaboration of the Church—his natural right and sole possession."

THE PONTIFF reminded the chaplains that in their work they will mainly deal with individuals and small groups who lack the benefit of association with large Italian national communities like those existing in other continents. Hence, he said, the chaplains must dedicate a large part of their activities to works of corporal mercy, perhaps even legal help. In this way, the Holy Father added, the emigrants will be disposed toward better reception of spiritual aid which includes the possibility of making confession in Italian.

The Pontiff also counseled the chaplains to urge their spiritual charges toward attending local churches and adapting themselves to the religious life of their new homes. He emphasized the importance for the emigrants to make contact with local Catholic labor and youth organizations.

Churches Near Bottom Of Steel Allocation List

Washington, D. C.—(RNS)—Religious institutions have been dropped near the bottom of the list for allocations of steel as a result of the two-month steel strike, an announcement by the National Production Authority revealed. In a move to make up the setback suffered by defense production from the loss of 20,000,000 tons of steel, the NPA has virtually prohibited starts on new construction projects except those directly related to the defense effort.

Before new starts for church buildings of religious institutions can be considered in the final quarter of 1952, NPA said, production schedules of defense, atomic energy, and machine tool programs must be satisfied. In addition, certain defense-supported construction will be given higher priority than churches.

CHICAGO DIES New York (NC)—The Rev. (Capt.) Joseph Belton, C.M., Air Force chaplain flown from Tokyo to California for an emergency operation several months ago, died (Aug. 2) at St. Albans Naval Hospital here.

U. S. Catholic War Relief Services Expects Share In Ford Foundation

New York—(NC)—War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference is one of four major voluntary agencies which will participate in the \$2,900,000 Ford Foundation donation made to solve Europe's refugee problem, according to word received here.



SESSIONS to determine how James Harris the \$2,900,000 fund will be distributed among the agencies currently are being held in Geneva, Switzerland, at the office of Dr. G. J. van Heuven Goedhart, United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, it is stated.

The Catholic agency is being represented at the sessions by James J. Navagh, European director for WRS. N.C.W.C. The other agencies which it is said will share in the fund are the World Council of Churches (Protestant); the Lutheran World Federation, and the American Joint Distribution Committee (Jewish).

The Rev. Aloysius J. Wycialek, assistant executive director of WRS—N.C.W.C., said that all allotments from the fund will be used by the Catholic agency for resettlement projects and for integration work, such as self-help programs, designed to assist refugees to find a more secure place in communities where they now reside.

Louisiana Registers Clergy Assisting At Marriages

New Orleans—(NC)—Because of the risks of illegal marriages due to unauthorized persons officiating, Louisiana has a new provision which requires that a clergyman be registered in the civil parish, or parishes, in which he wishes to Code of Louisiana reads: An amendment to the Civil Performances Act.

"ANY MINISTER of the Gospel, or priests of any religious sect, who having been first registered with the clerk of the District Court for the parishes in which they are officiating, as an authorized person to perform marriage ceremonies, whether a citizen of the United States or not, may celebrate marriages within this state, upon complying with the regulations of the law."

IT IS necessary, however, for this representing priest to bring the signatures of all priests he is representing. Each signature is to be on a separate index card or on a sheet of stationery of his ecclesiastical parish. Registration in the Parish of Orleans is with the New Orleans Health Department. Registration in the other parishes of the State is with the clerk of court.

Puerto Rico Adopts Spanish King Crest

San Juan, Puerto Rico—(NC)—The Puerto Rican legislature has approved a bill to adopt the old coat-of-arms of the Spanish Catholic rulers, Ferdinand and Isabella, as the official coat-of-arms of the new Free Associated State of Puerto Rico.

The coat-of-arms, according to the text of the bill will be a green coat-of-arms (round) and inside it a silver lamb over a red book and a flag with a cross and its pennant like the one in the emblem of St. John. The inscription will state "Joannes est nomen eius" (John is his name).

N.C.W.C. officials, a proposed program was worked out to involve the U.N. High Commission, the Provisional Intergovernmental Committee for Movement of Migrants from Europe (PICMME) and the four major voluntary agencies.

Dr. George N. Shuster, Hunter College president and former land commissioner for Bavaria, Germany, was selected to discuss the proposed program with the Foundation officials. The \$2,900,000 donation came as a result of the conference.
