

Fr. LeFrois, Benedictine To Serve As Army Chaplain

Rev. Christian Glenn LeFrois, O.S.B., son of Mr. and Mrs. George LeFrois, Stone Road, Rochester, will be released shortly from his duties as assistant pastor of the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament, Gretna, Pa., for service as a chaplain with the U. S. Air Corps.

Announcement was made in Latrobe, Pa. by Rt. Rev. Denis O. Skittmatter, D.D., Archbishop of St. Vincent Archdiocese.

Father Christian will report to Fort Slocum Long Island, Oct. 6, and will be commissioned as a 1st Lieutenant.

EDUCATED AT Holy Rosary School and Aquinas Institute, Rochester, he began his studies for the priesthood at St. Vincent Preparatory School, Latrobe, Pa. After two years of study at St. Vincent College, he was admitted as a novice for St. Vincent Archdiocese and professed as a Benedictine monk July 2, 1941.

Ordained to the priesthood following the completion of his studies at St. Vincent Seminary, June 16, 1945. Father Christian was appointed to the faculty of St. Thomas Military School, Rock Castle, Va. He later filled parochial charges at Shamokin, Pa. and Erie, Pa. He has been at the Greenburg Cathedral since August 1951.

Father Shoniker Named National NFCCS Chaplain

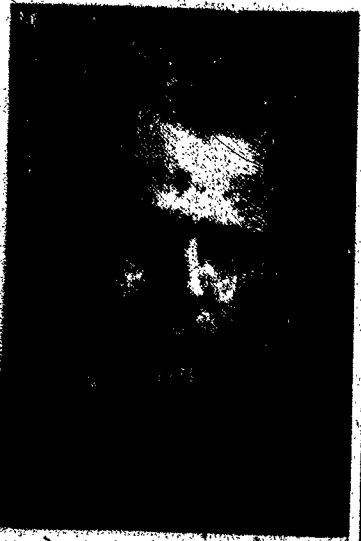
Rev. Fintan P. Shoniker, O.S.B. of St. Vincent College, Latrobe (Pa.) was appointed national chaplain of the National Federation of Catholic College Students by Archbishop John J. Mitty of San Francisco, episcopal moderator of the Youth Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, in Washington.

The appointment will become effective Sept. 15 and will be for a two-year period.

In his new post, Father Shoniker will be associated with Very Rev. Msgr. Joseph E. Schieler, director of the Youth Department, and world-wide authority in the field of youth work who has just returned to Washington from an Army assignment in Germany.

DIRECTOR OF LIBRARIES, public relations and alumni relations at St. Vincent College, Father Shoniker will continue these positions. He has been associated with the Catholic college federation since 1945 and as national chaplain will serve more than 200 member colleges.

Bp. Muench Tells Verein Of Church-State Separation

Delegates of two leading Catholic organizations applauded a declaration in St. Louis, Mo., that the American principle of separation of Church and State was never intended "to keep God out of American life, and still less out of the education of youth."

The statement was contained in a message received from Archbishop Aloisius J. Muench of Fargo, N. D., at present serving as Papal Nuncio to Germany. It was read at the opening of the 97th annual convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America and the 86th annual convention of the National Catholic Women's Union Both bodies met here simultaneously for five-day sessions.

Archbishop Muench called the view that separation of Church and State was intended to keep God out of American life and schools "a falsification of history." He stressed that the principle does not stand above the view that "the child is on earth to know and to love God, His works of creation, and His means of salvation. His goodness and mercy, His justice and His charity."

"IT IS FATAL for the education of a child if education is religious at home and unreligious in the school," Archbishop

\$54,000,000 Spent To Expand Power

"The area served by Rochester Gas and Electric is keeping pace with the post-war expansion program of the electric power companies" according to R. C. & E. Executive Vice President Robert E. Ginna.

"Since 1945" said Mr. Ginna, "we have spent nearly \$54,000,000 on new electric facilities, including generating plants, transmission and distribution lines and other equipment. We have increased our electric system capability from 186,475 kilowatts in 1945 to 303,080 kilowatts, a gain of 62 per cent and this will be further expanded in the next two years. This expansion assures all of this area an adequate and dependable supply of electric power for homes, farms and industries."

Mr. Ginna's comment was occasioned by the report of a study made by the National Association of Electric Companies covering the power situation throughout the country.

Edison Tech Lists Exams, Registration

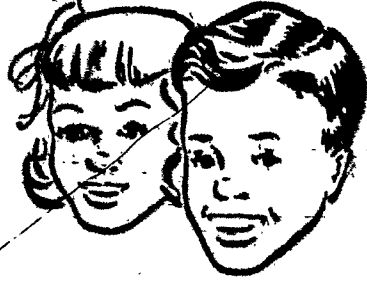
The fall term at Edison Technical and Industrial High School starts Sept. 3. There has been an increasing registration by boys who desire technical training.

To assist the faculty in placing the boys to best advantage and guiding their entry in certain shops of their desire, there will be a classification examination and registration at 2:00 p. m. Tuesday, August 26.

The school gives instruction in 15 different trades in 23 shops using modern equipment which is a duplicate of the equipment used in many factories here in town.

The manufacturers give advice to the school through the Industrial Management Council of Rochester Industries. They, in turn, have an advisory committee on technical instructions which assists the teachers in giving the boys instructions that keep them up-to-date on modern manufacturing processes.
