### Radio, TV Institute Opens First Convent in Canada

Montreal—Les Filles de Saint Paul—the Daughters of St. Paul—a religious community founded to serve for the glory of God and the salvation of souls through the latest inventions of science and art, has been established in Montreal.

This missionary institute seeks to make Our Lord known through raising to the dignity of the apostolate, television, radio, motion pictures and the press.

THE MONTREAL convent was established by five nuns sent from the motherhouse in Rome. They include four Italians and one French nun. Already they have two French-Canadian postulants. The institute has houses in Italy, France, Spain, the United States, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Colombia, Chile, the Philippines and Japan.

The institute was founded by Rev. Jacques Alberione in Italy in 1925 and now has 2,500 members throughout the world. Its mission is to "write, print and propagate the truth" and is a response to the call of Pope Pius XI to employ and perfect for the

### Hollywood In Focus

The American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars did well to take up with the Hollywood people, this problem of Communism and fellow travelers in the movie studios.

As powerful organizations of patriotic Americans they articulated public sentiments in terms of dollars and cents, language better understood by some in the show business, than any appeal to loyal instincts.

Many Hollywood producers, once they saw that the Reds had indeed infiltrated the studios, were ready out of loyalty to take firm action to throw them out. All the Hollywood producers were slow to suspect, however, and might have been slower had not the veterans taken their stand behind those of us who fear several years, and a side-line and reprisal at the hands of studio big shots who would not even investigate for themselves, our charges that Reds were burrowing into American movies.

THE UN-AMERICAN Activities Committee investigations put an end to that and a courageous job has since been done by the Hollywood studio heads, many of whom have taken serious legal risks and authorized heavy financial losses in their efforts to clean house.

Commendable caution has been exercised to avoid harming innocent people. Many employees who admit to having been duped by the Communists, even to the extent of taking up Party membership, have been given another chance. Proof of their newly planted loyalty remains to be seen. Thus too, under masquerades as "liberals," some other pro-Communists have eluded exposure. Their turns must come unless they change their ways.
