The Radio Rosary will be broadcast every night at 7 p. m. over Station WSAY, Rochester, Saturday night, and rebroadcast by WGVA, Geneva and WWHG, Hornell, at their convenience.

The committee comprises the Rev. Joseph A. Cirincione, pastor of St. Francis of Assisi, founder and only director of the broadcast since it was organized; Frank E. Wolfe, Joseph W. Benn and Frank R. Davis.

Hundreds of laymen have been heard leading the Rosary each night and thousands of men and women have responded during the more than two years the nightly Rosary has been recited.

## Watkins Pastor Describes Restored Easter Vigil Rites

The Thirteenth National Liturgical Week, meeting in Cleveland, Aug. 18 to 21, under the patronage of Archbishop Edward F. Hoban, studied the historical background, spiritual significance, and ritual directives of the new, and yet optional, Easter Vigil Rite.

Rev. Gerald Ellard, S.J., reviewed the Decrees of the Congregation of Rites in 1951 and 1952 which authorized the restoration of the original observance of the great Feast of our Lord's Resurrection.

In the course of time, and for a variety of reasons, Father Ellard pointed out, this Vigil Ceremony was antiquated, first on Holy Saturday evening, later in the early afternoon, and finally on Holy Saturday morning. This shift in time was detrimental to the original symbolism of the rite.

REV. BENEDICT EHMANN, of Watkins Glen, described the ceremony as conducted in St. Mary of the Lake parish this past Holy Saturday and the increased attendance and sincere devotion of the people compared with former years when the early Saturday morning rite was used.

## Registration High In All Schools Opening Sept. 3

More than 37,488 school children of elementary and secondary grades, last year's total, will report for classes in the Catholic Schools of the Diocese of Rochester on Wednesday, Sept. 3 according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent of diocesan schools.

The increase of pupils in the See City area will be at least 1,000, Monsignor Mahoney said. To handle the greater number, the Diocese has hired additional lay teachers, at the rate of about one for every eight nuns, he stated.

In the Elmira area, the registration for six Catholic schools is up 6 percent.

Many schools especially in suburban parishes will be taxed to the utmost to accommodate the pupils. In all schools, work has been carried on during the summer refurbishing the desks and rooms.

Accurate enrollments will be released by the diocesan school office after the schools open.

## Seminaries, Colleges Report Student Gains

Diocesan seminaries and colleges will open for the fall term with increased enrollments, according to reports received at the Courier Journal office, this week.

The major theological institution, St. Bernard's Seminary, will open on Tuesday, Sept. 5 with an enrollment of 270 students. Besides Rochester diocese students will come from Syracuse, Hartford, Buffalo, Albany, Ogdensburg, Worcester, Mass., Savannah-Atlanta, Ga., St. Augustine, Florida, and Tucson, Arizona dioceses.

St. Bernard's faculty is prepared to instruct the large number of seminarians according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfrid Craugh, rector.

Opening of the high school department will take place on Tuesday, Sept. 3 with Mass at 9 a. m. it was announced by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Maynard A. Connell, rector. The college department will open on Wednesday, Sept. 10 at 9 a. m.

St. Andrew's will have an entering class of approximately 200 students. Besides Rochester diocese, they will come from Syracuse, Albany, St. Augustine, Fla., and Tucson, Arizona, dioceses.
