Africa Mission Project To Center At Aquinas Here

 Five programs of mission action, beamed at five great areas of life, were launched at the 15th National Convention of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade.
 The convention, largest in CSMC history, was held at the University of Notre Dame. It brought together 3,000 students, educators, and mission leaders for four days of discussion on the religious crisis of our times and the opportunities of Catholic American youth to meet the problems.
 UNDER THE leadership of Bishops Edward Mason, of the Anglo Egyptian Sudan, and Paul Furuya, of Kyoto, Japan, the congress put into operation programs for establishing correspondence between students in colleges and universities in Africa and Japan and students in the United States.
 Centers for the African correspondence project will be at Aquinas Institute, Rochester, N. Y., and Mount Mary College, Milwaukee. The Japanese correspondence will be centered at West Baden College, West Baden Springs, Ind., with Robert Dressman, S.J., recently returned from the Catholic University of Tokyo, as chairman.
 A program designed to create solidarity in the missionary activities of Catholics in the United States and the Latin American countries, outlined by Bishop Raymond A. Lane, Superior General of Maryknoll, will provide for the sending of a one-man mission to confer with Catholic groups in the individual countries of South America.
 For this mission, it was proposed that an executive of a Catholic university in the U. S. be appointed and that he report his findings to college groups in the States upon his return.
