## 375,000 Mark Passed At Parish Dance

Have you been to the Immaculate's Friday night dances? Most everyone has. They began in 1940 and have continued weekly, summer and winter, (except during Lent) ever since. According to the Rev. George S. Wood, assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception parish, where the dances are held, "Three hundred seventy-five thousand have danced here since 1940."

There are plenty of things going at Immaculate and always a live orchestra to play for dancing. Joe Nolan's band plays weekly but last Friday was a special night, the first dance of the new fall season, so there was an additional orchestra, Johnnie Matt's, to keep everybody going through the entire evening.

So everyone will be happily occupied from 9 to 12, (no one goes out once they arrive unless they do not intend to return). There is a bar for "tobacco" and tomato juice, records to play during intermission and soon there will be a television set.

MEANY WEEKLY devotees of the Friday night dances will all themselves of bargain prices by getting the "giant economy size" pass book, good for 25 evenings of entertainment, for five dollars. This saves them about half on the price of single tickets.

Represented last week were students from Jefferson, Franklin, Edison Tech, Madison, West, Mercy, Nazareth, St. Agnes, East, Aquinas, Fairport, Rush-Henrietta, St. Joseph's Commercial and Brockport. Also St. John Fisher, Brockport State and the U. of R.

IT MIGHT seem that rowdiness would result sometimes from such a congregation of youth. This is not the case at the Immaculate sponsored dances. There are always at least two priests from the adjacent church in attendance as well as a group of young adults who act as chaperones. An added note of authority is furnished by the presence of a policeman.

Father Woods, who is in charge of the dances, admits to a lot of behind the scenes work to produce them. Most of every Friday he devotes to being carpenter, electrician and general handyman putting up the bandstand, fixing lights and seeing that all will be in readiness for the evening rush of youthful dancers. In addition to this, every six or seven weeks he puts out 6,000 bids to the dances which are distributed to city high school students.

There have been 24 converts to the faith during the last year and a half that can be traced in one way or another to the dances. Typical of this fact is the case of three weeks ago.

A GIRL CAME up to Father Woods and asked what had to be done to become a Catholic. Later in the evening another girl came up with the same question. Both have now begun instruction and in each case the girls appeared at the rectory at the appointed time, one with her sister and the other with a friend, both of whom wanted instruction in the faith.

There is no active campaign put on at the dances to gain converts but the presence of priests and the easy access the teenagers have to ask them questions is a major factor. Permission of the parents is necessary before instructions may begin.

Although the dances are no matrimonial bureau, there is quite a roster of those who have met at the dances and later married.

PRESENT LAST Friday for the kickoff dance of the season were some "teenage diplomats" from Europe who are over here to study in our schools and live our life for a year. They were without exception surprised at what they saw. A hall so large a dance so big, a crowd so great, and everyone dancing to jazz. "Just as it is not that way in my country," was their reaction.

Just as it danced over there? Certainly. But according to the "diplomats" jazz is for a special kind of dance. It is the initial, the revolutionist against tradition, the student described as an existentialist who goes in for jazz in Europe.

There just wouldn't be a hall large enough for a dance on the scale of Immaculate. Even if there were, the dance wouldn't be held. "The headmaster would not approve." Dances there are held more in private houses and for pupils of the same school and class.

Here girls love to be "cut" at a dance. "Over there" a boy who "cuts in" on another boy's dance would be invited outside for a punch in the jaw. The "diplomats" present Friday were all boys.
