

140 Freshmen Enrolled At Nazareth College

Classes will begin at Nazareth College Wednesday morning, Sept. 17, with the largest freshman enrollment in the college's 28-year history. More than 140 freshmen are expected, according to Sister Marie Ann, registrar. Final registration figures are incomplete. The academic year will formally begin with the celebration of 9 o'clock mass by the Rev. William H. Shannon, college chaplain.

THE TWO DAYS before the beginning of classes are orientation days. Monday freshmen will tour the campus, be welcomed by Reverend Mother M. Helene, president of the college, and take a series of placement tests to be used in the guidance program.

Sister Rose Angela, dean of women, will discuss the objectives of a college education and Dr. Jean Foley, resident physician, will explain the college health program. New students will also meet the heads of departments in which they plan to concentrate.

Tuesday freshmen will be entertained by their "big sisters, juniors, with a skit, 'The Student Princess,'" written and directed by Dorothy Fischer of the junior class. In the evening they will be guests of a banquet on campus.

Mr. Lagonegro, prominent Catholic layman, treasurer for Elmira area of the Bishop's High School Jubilee Fund and one of the founders of Elmira's famed Arctic League, died Saturday, Sept. 6, 1952, after a brief illness.

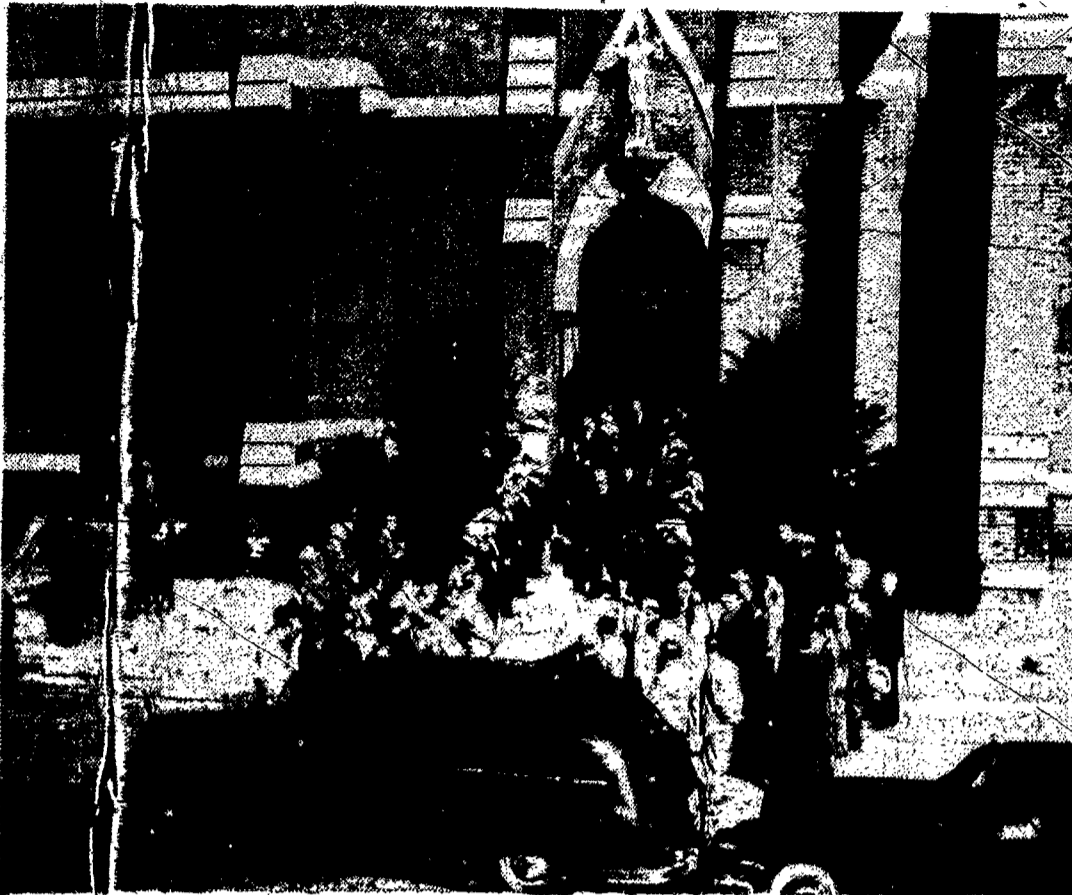

Editorial tribute to the late Harry J. Lagonegro, prominent Catholic layman and citizen of Elmira, was paid in the Elmira Star Gazette Sept. 6, as follows:

HARRY J. LAGONEGRO Harry J. Lagonegro had a friendliness for his fellows, an innate integrity and fine character, which impelled him to do for others out of sheer goodness of heart.

His beginning was humble, but industry, honesty, and interest in others saw the small business he started grow and flourish into one of the city's substantial concerns.

Older Elmira men never will forget that it was in Lagonegro's cigar store on Lake St. many years ago that the group of patrons who gathered there founded the Arctic League, now one of Elmira's well established and famous institutions.

Harry Lagonegro served the League in every capacity, his heart was always in its benevolent work for children at Christmas time.

He kept in constant touch with local affairs; and his counsel and guidance have been more valuable to many than is generally realized. His judgment of men and events was excellent. He was unpretentious and unassuming; he never sought advancement or honors, but took them only when others insisted he should as a reward of merit for his many labors in behalf of others.

A good sterling citizen was Harry Lagonegro, one who will be missed in Elmira in many fields of endeavor.
