(Continued from Page 1) either side of the gymnasium with direct access to the athletic field.

A STAGE, 23 feet by 40 feet, with ample dressing rooms on either side will be located at one end of the auditorium. Public entrance to the auditorium-gymnasium will be separate and distinct from that of the school entrance. This will allow public activities to be carried on without any entry through the school.

The student entrance to the auditorium will be at the opposite end and will open directly from the main corridor of the school.

The 26 acre site will also provide ample space for a regulation football field, a baseball diamond and a parking lot accommodating 435 cars.

THE BUILDING will be constructed of the resistive materials such as concrete foundations, steel or reinforced concrete frame, brick and tile walls, concrete floors and roof, and metal louvered windows.

Floors throughout will be covered with wood, ceramic tile or a composition material, each serving its particular function.

Acoustical tile ceilings will be used in areas requiring this type of treatment and corridors will be of terra cotta tile wainscoting with recessed metal lockers accommodating the requirements of the student body.

INTERIOR WALLS are to be of under block painted. All plumbing facilities of the latest design and proportions to accommodate the student body will be used.

The lighting requirements will meet the accepted standards for schoolhouse lighting and consist of both fluorescent and incandescent type fixtures.

### Archbishop Cushing Edits New Magazine For Nurses

Boston (NC)—A new Catholic magazine personally edited by an Archbishop has made its first appearance.

The Catholic Nurse will be both edited and financed for two years by Archbishop Cushing of Boston. The Archbishop is episcopal chairman of the National Catholic Welfare Conference Department of Lay Organizations, which includes the National Council of Catholic Nurses, whose official publication the new magazine will be. TO BE published quarterly, The Catholic Nurse has a circulation of approximately 20,000. A copy has been sent to every Catholic hospital and school of nursing in the United States and to the 15,000 members of the N.C.C.W.

In launching the magazine, Archbishop Cushing stated that it was his intention to make it readable, enlightening, a mouth-piece for nursing under Catholic auspices and a medium of inspiration to all the units and members of the Council.

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
