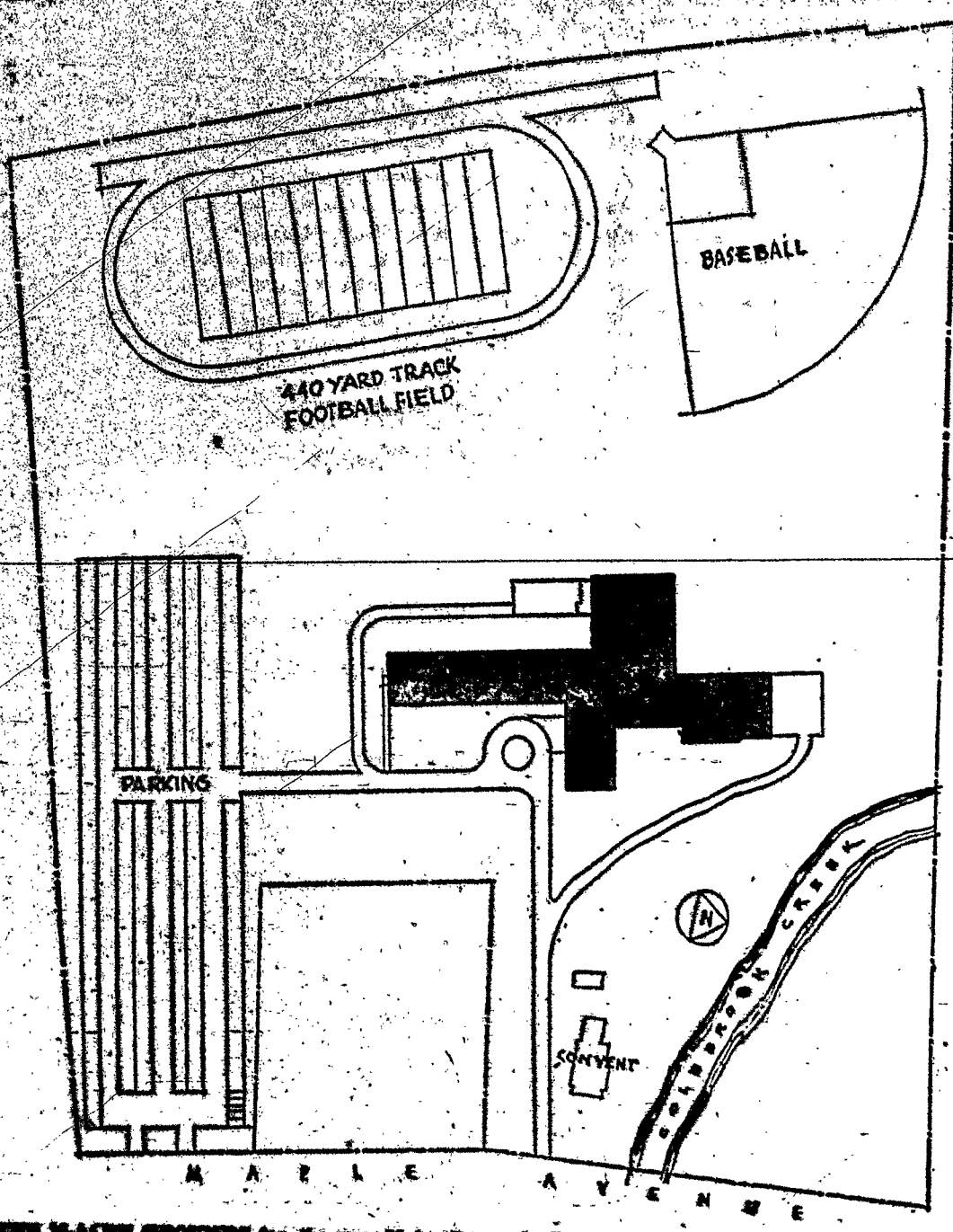


### New High School Grounds Outlined



THESE PLANNED GROUNDS FOR THE NEW Notre Dame de Lourdes High School on Lower Maple Ave. near Cedar Ave., Rochester, will appear as above when the school and other facilities are completed. The school will be slightly forward on the tract, facing Maple Ave. The present Notre Dame building facing the street will be converted into a convent for the Sisters of Mercy who will operate the school. At the south end of the tract will be a 440-yard track, and a regulation baseball diamond, located by the school, baseball and tennis, architectural firm.

### Elmira Dominican Nuns To Hold Novena At Monastery

Eighth Annual Rosary Novena will open at the Dominican Monastery at 1310 W. Church St., Elmira on Saturday evening, Sept. 27.

The devotions each evening through Oct. 4 will consist of recitation of the Rosary, a Sermon and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The Rev. J. Edmund O'Brien, Chaplain, assisted by several of the local clergy, will conduct the services. Mass at the Monastery each morning will be at 7 a.m. For those who find it convenient to attend. This part of the Novena, however, may be fulfilled in a parish church.

CLOSING SERVICES will be held at an outdoor altar on Rosary Sunday, Oct. 5. This devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary is believed one of the most efficacious offered by Holy Mother Church. Each year in the Elmira Monastery and in the Dominican Convents throughout the world countless miraculous answers to prayers and petitions are reported.

More than nine years ago, eight Dominican Nuns came to Elmira from Buffalo, for the purpose of establishing a foundation in this Community. Since that time, five other postulants have been accepted at Rosary Hill, as the local Monastery is known.

MANY CHANGES have taken place, since that August day, when these Sisters left the well established Convent in Buffalo to pioneer in a venture, which would daunt even strong men.

Today, a little Monastery and a new modern permanent wing, which was recently completed, stands as an evidence of the courage of these Religious and the gratitude of many Elmira Catholics for this Spiritual Stronghold.

### Bandit Activity Linked To Russia Latin-America Aim

Bogota, Colombia — (NC) — The increased bandit activities in Colombia are part of a communist plan to seize control of key Latin American countries, the Colombian Minister of War, Jose Maria Bernal, charged in a nationwide radio address here.

The plan is supervised by Russian agents in "one of the Caribbean countries," the War Minister stated. He did not name the

country. However, recent reports have stated that a Red embassy in Cuba has taken over direction of communist activities in Latin America.

(A RECENT issue of Central American Studies, published in San Salvador, states that a Red headquarters is operative in Cuba which receives instructions from Prague.

(The aim of the Red activity, according to the magazine, is to seize control of Guatemala, then Costa Rica, Colombia and finally Venezuela, which is regarded as the prize country because of its vast oil reserves.)

Mr. Bernal declared that the Colombian government has in its possession a Red-formulated program for seizing power in the country.

THE RED PLAN, called "Plan A," aims mainly at weakening the present Colombian army, the War Minister charged. He cited these objectives of the plan: (1) dispersal of the army by creating widely separated disturbances; (2) sabotage at factories, air bases and munitions stores; (3) theft of army uniforms, arms and ammunition from the small garrisons; and (4) the spread of demoralizing propaganda among the troops.

The War Minister declared that the Red plan also calls for attacks against the present government, the clergy and religion in general as "forces of oppression."

### Auriville, North American Martyr's Site, Oldest Shrine In New York State

Albany, N. Y. — (Special) — At Auriville, in New York

State's Mohawk Valley, is one of the most unique shrines in the United States. Becoming one of the world's popular centers for pilgrims and tourists, it is the oldest religious shrine in the State and is on the site of the martyrdom of America's first Christianized Indian.

More than 200,000 persons come from various sections of the United States and Canada to visit the Shrine of the "North American Martyr." The shrine is located on the site of the martyrdom of St. Kateri Tekakwithia, a young Indian girl who was killed by a Jesuit missionary, Father Jacques Kateri, in 1680. The shrine is one of the most beautiful and interesting in the State.

AT A COST of \$100,000, the Shrine was constructed in 1921 to accommodate the growing

number of people visiting the shrine each year.

The origin of the Shrine is the story of Father Isaac Jogues, a Jesuit missionary. He came to Canada from France to work among the Indians. In 1622, Jogues, Rene Goupil, a lay helper and surgeon, and some Christian Indians were captured by the Mohawks.

In route to Onondaga, and at other Indian villages, the prisoners underwent horrible tortures, including the gouging and being scorched with burning embers. Later, with the aid of the Dutch at Ramasawaryk, now Albany, Jogues escaped. He arrived in France after many hardships, January 5, 1644.

On his return to Onondaga, he was recaptured and killed by the Mohawks on June 30, 1649.

His body was buried in the Mohawk River, near the site of the Shrine.

Those who fail through negligence or indifference to exercise this right share moral responsibility with those who promote the election of incompetent, inefficient and unworthy candidates."

Seoul, Korea — (RNS) — Catholic authorities in Korea have issued a warning to the faithful to read with caution the so-called "prophecies" books. They also warned against the spread of "rumors" concerning prophecies and impostors.
