Centenary Mass Listed For Parish In Rexville

Rexville — St. Mary's Church will commemorate its centennial Sunday, Oct. 19, with a solemn High Mass celebrated by the Rev. John D. Malley, pastor.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney of Rochester will preside in cappa magna. The Very Rev. Magr. John E. Maney of Rochester, Vice Chancellor of the diocese, will be master of ceremonies to the Bishop. Chaplains to His Excellency will be the Rev. Lawrence W. Gannon, pastor of St. Ann's Church, Hornell, and the Rev. William Cannan, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Corning, former pastor of St. Mary's in Rexville.

The Rev. Joseph McDonnell, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church, Hornell will be deacon and the Rev. Leo Lynch, chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, sub-deacon. The Rev. James Slattery, assistant pastor of St. Ignatius, will be master of ceremonies. The second master of ceremonies will be the Rev. James O'Connell, assistant pastor of St. Lucy's Church in Rochester.

Other officers of the Mass will be James G. Malley, student at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, a nephew of Father Malley, Thurifer; Thomas Harkner, acolyte; Robert Kramarik, cross bearer and Emmett McNeil, train bearer.

IMMEDIATELY AFTER the Mass, Bishop Kearney will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to 23 children and two adults. He will also preach the sermon at the Mass.

Music for the Mass and for Confirmation will be by St. Mary's Church choir with Miss Marie Pruner of Hornell as director. The choir will sing the Choral Mass by Marsh.

St. Joachim's Choir of Canisteo is augmenting St. Mary's Choir. Mrs. Helen Calahan is organist.

Bishop Urges Campaign For Cathedral Convent, High School Support

Speaking as pastor of the newly elevated Sacred Heart Cathedral, His Excellency, Bishop Kearney addressed his parishioners on parish and diocesan projects at all the Masses Sunday. After celebrating the 7 a. m. Mass, the Bishop spoke at that and all remaining Masses. He read the Consistorial Decree raising the Sacred Heart edifice to Cathedral dignity. He told of the urgent need for a new home for the teaching Sisters in Cathedral School. The Bishop called for cooperation in the appeal to build two Catholic high schools in the city.

"Today begins the story of the new Cathedral in this diocese," the Bishop said. He termed it a significant event not only in the history of the parish but also in the Diocese of Rochester.

"WE FEEL," the Bishop said, "that under the patronage of Our Divine Lord, Himself, this will bring special blessings not only to this parish but to the entire diocese."

It is a happy coincidence the Bishop explained, that the founder of the parish, Monsignor George V. Burns has lived to see the church so dear to him, elevated to the dignity of a Cathedral. Monsignor Burns has practically watched as every stone of this edifice was laid.

The parish's founder whose own priestly career included so much service in old St. Patrick's Cathedral has now witnessed his own church becoming the mother church of the diocese. The Bishop expressed the hope that Monsignor Burns live long to see the church built under his direction, functioning as a Cathedral.

BISHOP KEARNEY explained that by the decree, the Bishop of the diocese becomes pastor and the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Lawrence B. Casey who has already done so much to beautify the church and parish property becomes rector.

"Because all parishioners here are now near to me, I have to speak to you of a project near to you," the Bishop said referring to the proposed new convent.

The history of the parish shows, His Excellency said, that there have been so generous and this generation should be entitled to rest on its laurels.

"However, driven by time and circumstances, there is no choice in the cries in which we find ourselves," the Bishop said.

"THE CONVENT you have had for years in the early days housed comfortably the nuns teaching in your school. As school enrollment increased, more nuns were added and now the convent cannot adequately take care of them."

"Building of a convent is no concession to luxury," Bishop Kearney said. "We are obliged to give these self-sacrificing Sisters a residence that will provide them adequate living and a suitable place in which to relax and also do the work assigned them."

Campaign For Cathedral Convent Opens Saturday

A campaign for the new Sacred Heart Convent and the Bishop's High School-Jubilee Fund to be conducted in Sacred Heart Cathedral Parish will be opened at a dinner in the schoolhall, Saturday, Oct. 11 at 6 p. m.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will be the principal speaker according to the Rt. Rev. Magr. Lawrence B. Casey, Cathedral rector. Minimum needed is \$388,975. It is stated in a brochure prepared for the campaign.

Campaign workers including a Big Gifts Committee and headed by Division Leaders will conduct the campaign in the parish from Oct. 12 to Oct. 25.

BISHOP KEARNEY appealing for a generous response in a letter in the campaign brochure said: "Even though you are asked for what seems a big sacrifice to make this campaign a success, do not forget the sacrifices of the Sisters whom we hope to house."

"The real need for a decent, convenient, adequate in space and conveniently located, has been explained to you from the pulpit and through our campaign and parish bulletins," Monsignor Casey said in the brochure.

"No parishioner of good will seriously questions the necessity for such a move. Likewise, the Catholics of the city recognize their common obligation to furnish enough secondary schools to accommodate our young people and thus relieve the present crushing burden on our existing high schools."

PLANS FOR a homelike, modified Gregorian exterior convent building are now being prepared by Edward M. Lorschelder and Donald M. Walzer, Associated Constructors is expected to begin on or about March 15, 1953. (Complete description will be found in adjoining columns).

The campaign is headed by the Rt. Rev. Magr. George V. Burns, rector emeritus, founder and first pastor of the parish and Monsignor Casey as honorary chairman.

Founder's Day Program To Open At Mass In Nazareth

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will begin Nazareth Colleges' observance of Founders' Day Wednesday, Oct. 15, by celebrating 10 o'clock Mass in the college auditorium.

A Communion Breakfast will follow, with the Very Rev. Magr. John Maney, the bishop's secretary, as guest speaker. He will describe the Eucharistic Congress at Barcelona which he attended last summer.

Classes will be suspended, according to Sister Rose Angela, dean of women.

THE DIOCESAN college for women observes Founders' Day on Oct. 15 because it was on that date in 1850 that the order of the Sisters of St. Joseph, who conduct the college, was founded in France. The observance includes special devotion to St. Joseph.

The day is set aside annually to honor the founders of the college.

Among these are Bishop Bernard McQuaid, founder of the Rochester parochial school system; Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, at whose request the college was established in 1924; Mother M. Sylvester, General Superior of the order and first president of the college; Sister Teresa Marie, first dean, having served in that capacity for 25 years; Rev. Mother Rose Miriam,

a member of the original faculty and second president of the college; and Bishop Kearney, under whose administration the college was moved in 1942 from Augustine St. to its present location on East Avenue.
