### Mrs. Frank Eaton Elected State Governor Of IFCA

Stressing particularly the role of loyalty, His Excellency Bishop Kearney, speaking last Saturday at the convention banquet of New York State chapter, International Federation of Catholic Alumnae, told his audience of the influence this can exert both as an organization and as individuals.

ROCHESTER CIRCLE of the I.F.C.A. for the first time since its founding in 1931, has a member elected state governor. She is Mrs. Frank A. Eaton, former state social service chairman and former regent of the Rochester Circle.

Mrs. Lewis J. Boyce, Rochester, was elected recording secretary of the New York state chapter and Miss Beverly McLoughlin, also of Rochester, was appointed trustee of the central New York district.

In addition to Rochester women elected to office were Mrs. Charles Cunningham, New York

City, 1st vicegovernor; Miss Ethel Curley, New York City, 2nd vicegovernor; Mrs. Stanley Michaels, Syracuse, 3rd vicegovernor; Mrs. Hazel Eler, Buffalo, corresponding secretary and Mrs. James McLoughlin Jr., Brooklyn, treasurer.

AS AN organization the Bishop warned I.F.C.A. members of the dangers today of being parochial. Although everyone knows that alumnae owe their first loyalty to their school, this loyalty to one's school should be built into loyalty to state and national alumnae groups.

The Bishop advised that this loyalty "must become the foundation of the national organization" of the I.F.C.A.

Not forgetting personal loyalty but taking all loyalties together and cementing them in loyalty to Holy Mother Church is one of the ends to be made of loyalty to school and organization.

The nuns, "the life blood of the whole picture" of loyalty, as Bishop Kearney termed them, are too often taken for granted when without them and the work they do there could be no Catholic schools and colleges, no Federation of Catholic Alumnae.

"Catholic Alumnae must do what they can in their own way to bring before the public what the nuns are doing."

Pointing out today's need for more religious vocations, and saying "Not that our girls are less willing to make the sacrifice than before, but opposition to vocations being a deterrent, His Excellency outlined for his listeners what they might do to foster interest in religious vocations.

PERSONAL contact, explaining to parents the nature of a vocation, that it is a compulsion to do the will of God, not a lack of respect to the parents, that prompts a girl to enter religion, may help a girl meeting with obstacles from her parents.

Vocations may be fostered by lay teachers offering a word of encouragement to the students. When there are so many talking up the difficulties of being a nun, someone saying something nice may, as Bishop Kearney expressed it, "be responsible for a magnificent apostolate."

Concluding his suggestions, Bishop Kearney spoke in behalf of the nuns themselves who should be made to realize that the work they do and the sacrifices they make are appreciated. They should be visited by the alumnae, encouraged in their vocation and prayers should be said for them.
