

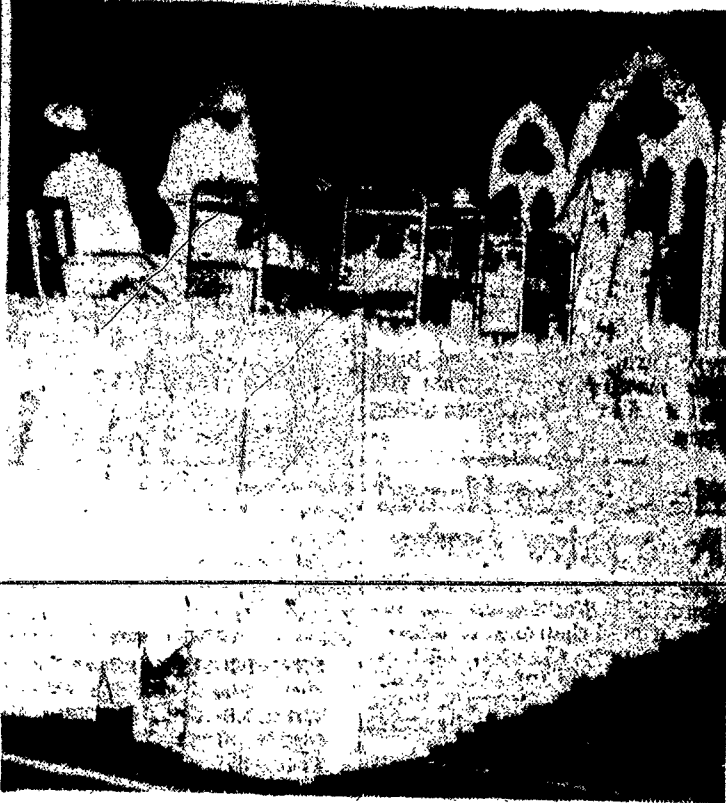
### Disabled Vets Feted In Geneva

### Columbus Reliance on Mary Stressed At K. C. Dinner

"We, like Christopher Columbus, are sailing into strife, today with a feeling of confidence because we are relying on Holy Mary," His Excellency Bishop Kearney told members of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus and guests at a dinner Monday evening in Powers Hotel.

The Bishop and John J. Coffey of Buffalo, executive assistant, department of Health, Erie County were speakers at the dinner marking Columbus Day.

Observance of the day on which their patron discovered America was opened on Sunday by the knights at a High Mass in St. Joseph's Church celebrated by the Rev. Matthew Tobin, C.S.S.R., council chaplain.

Columbus, the Bishop said, chose to sail on the Santa Maria in his voyage brought him to American shores. In spite of storms the "Holy Mary" brought him safely to port.

The spirit of today is caused by results from the dethronement of God, the Bishop said. He cited divorce, betrayal of public trust, sale of indecent literature (especially corrupting youth) and the radio broadcasts all over the country including those in this diocese in which "Holy Mary" is becoming most familiar on Rosary hours.
