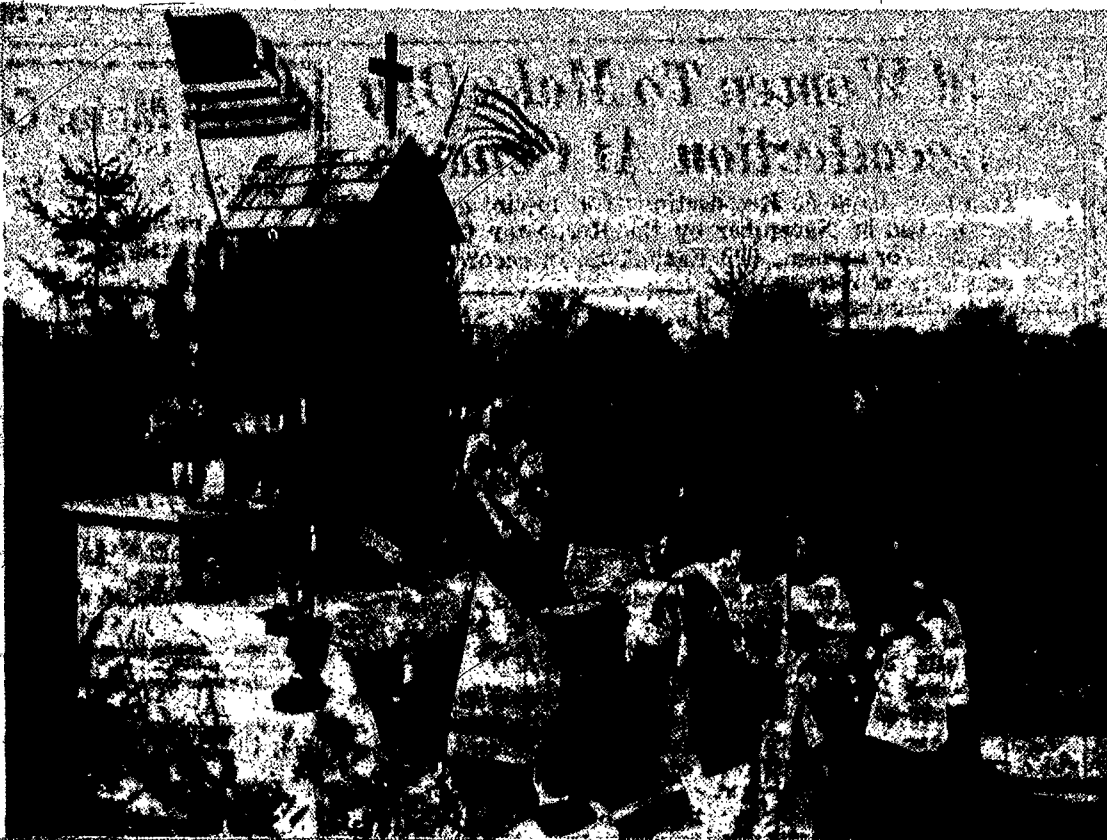


Shrine At Camp Columbus Dedicated

College Life Explained To 150 High Schoolers

For more than 150 high school seniors of Rochester area, Columbus Day was Sub-Frosh Day at Nazareth College. They spent what would have been a day away from books visiting the diocesan college for women.

They heard seven of the college department heads discuss opportunities for women in teaching, social work, nursing, medical technology, librarianship, secretarial science and chemistry.

With sophomores as guides, they toured the East Ave. campus, visited classes in session, met some of the faculty and saw an original student skit. The Rev. William H. Shannon, chaplain, showed slides of campus activities. Patricia Krenzer was chairman of the affair, assisted by Michela Frascatore, Joan Ziegler and Marcia Wood.

SISTER EVA MARIE, placement director, opened the career panel by telling the visitors what Nazareth College graduates do. Of the 400 students in the last five graduating classes, she said, 142 are now teaching in schools ranging from the kindergarten through college. Seventy are doing social work; 50 nursing, 55 secretarial work, 34 scientific work, and the remainder are in various fields including library work, commercial art, personnel, radio, government service, law, dentistry and medicine.

SISTER JOSEPH MARY, head of the education department, said that Nazareth College will help the student take the right path to complete, wholesome living and enable her to impart the same to others.

SISTER DOMINIC, head of the library science department, citing Father Keller's *Sex Can Change the World*, mentioned desirable positions throughout the country open to those who complete a fifth year of library science after graduating from college.

SISTER PAULETTE, head of the sociology department, said that the purpose of this field is to help people live harmoniously with others. Success in the field, she said, depends on the student's

love of people and desire to help them.

SISTER MARGARET MARY, head of the nursing department, spoke of the critical shortage of nurses and pointed out that when the Christian nurse ministers to ailing human beings, she ministers to Christ.

SISTER MAINE AUGUSTINE, head of the chemistry department, and Sister Francis Solano, head of the biology department, spoke of the present-day need for women trained in the physical sciences.

MISS ELEANORE FARR, head of the department of secretarial science, said that a fine cultural background is one of the requisites of an efficient secretary, and that the college-trained secretary has the "opening wedge" into many fields such as advertising, banking and office management.
