'Fatima' Wins Prelates Praise

Washington—(NC)—The Apostolic Delegate to the United States characterized as "most reverently executed and warmly appealing" the film "The Miracle of Our Lady of Fatima" when he viewed it at a special showing here.

The film began a run at the RKO Palace Theater, Rochester, Wednesday, Oct. 15. Gilbert Roland and Susan Whitney have starring roles in the movie.

The film brings to the screen many of the drama-packed events connected with the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin to three shepherd children at Fatima, Portugal, 35 years ago. Archdiocese Amleto Giovanni Ciognani, accompanied by members of his staff at the Delegation. Members of the staff of the National Catholic Welfare Conference also were present at the screening, prior to the film's commercial showing in the national capital.

A high spot of the film is the portrayal of the "miracle of the sun" on October 13, 1917. At that time thousands saw the sun spin toward the earth and then rise back into the sky. This constituted the "sign" which the Blessed Virgin earlier told the children she would give the people so they would believe in the apparitions and her message.

The bronze medallions signifying the October Christopher Awards have been bestowed on a new motion picture, a recently published book and the nation's most popular television program. "For the inspiration and high quality entertainment they provide to a vast audience."

The Rev. James Keller, M.M., founder and director of the Christopher Awards, announced that the MGM film, "Ivanhoe" was presented the award because it represents "a significant step in the direction of providing the public with entertainment of enduring spiritual quality."

Robert Taylor, cast in the role of Ivanhoe, handles the role capably. The viewer is caught and held by the gloriously spectacular, dashingly romantic epic. The references to prejudice against a Jewish family which may have been rampant in the Sir Walter Scott book, strike with a bang in the picture.

THE THIRTY MINUTE TV show, "I Love Lucy" scored a Christopher award, along with the biography, "Karen," by Marie Killilea, a Larchmont, N.Y., housewife who tells what faith and determination did for her daughter, Karen, who was affected by cerebral palsy. The TV program, a situation comedy of family life stars Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz and is viewed by an estimated 30,000,000 persons each week.

Asked to explain the Christopher awards Father Keller pointed out that while it is not required that an award winner have an explicit religious theme, it is expected that "each of them will reflect a warmth and freshness that can stem only from a spiritual inspiration."

The Christopher award was founded in 1945 to show what one person can do to improve the world. The organization has no memberships, no meetings and no dues. Their only office is maintained at 18 East 88th St., New York City and Monthly Christopher News Notes are sent free of charge to more than 700,000 followers.
