John Hackett, the coach who built Catholic Central into the most powerful team in Michigan from 1936 to 1942, has returned to the helm of the Detroiters.

### Schools Act Slowly On Prayer Bid

Albany, N. Y.—(RNS)—Only 300 of the state's 3,000 school districts have taken steps to comply with a 10-month-old recommendation of the New York State Board of Regents for recitation of a daily prayer, the State Education Department estimates.

Support for the prayer has been slow, a Department spokesman said, but is growing steadily.

THE SYRACUSE Board of Education was reported as having approved the prayer in December, but the board approved the prayer but does not require its use daily. The Utica School Board acted similarly, but specified that "no child whose parents object shall be required to participate."

The question of school prayers is listed as "under study" by the Albany Board of Education, Superintendent John W. Park said, and until a decision is reached the matter is being left to the discretion of the individual principals.

Mr. Park said he knew of only one Albany school using a prayer, and in that case it is offered at a weekly assembly, not daily. At another school, he said, the principal recites poetry of a religious nature at the weekly assembly.

MANY EDUCATION board members and school superintendents regard the prayer as a controversial issue and have hesitated clear of it because of possible opposition from some segments of the community.

The recommendation that each school day be opened with a non-denominational prayer was made by the Board of Regents in January.

The prayer suggested by the Regents is "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence upon Thee, and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country."

### New York City Asked To OK Charity Bingo

New York—(RNS)—A resolution sanctioning bingo games when held by religious, veteran and charitable organizations was introduced in the City Council here.

If adopted, the measure would ask Mayor Impellitteri and Police Commissioner George P. Monaghan to permit the games. Last month the Police Department ordered all bingo games discontinued.

COUNCILMAN EDWARD A. Cunningham, Bronx Democrat, submitted the resolution and asked for immediate action. His request for unanimous consent was blocked by Stanley M. Isaacs, minority leader, who urged a study of the measure. It was referred to the Council's Committee on General Welfare.

The resolution said that discontinuing bingo games "will cause great hardship to many who were and are the worthy objects of the charitable work of these institutions and organizations."

Many organizations are "dependent on the proceeds of bingo games to carry on their laudable aims and purposes," the resolution added, "and many citizens of the city gladly and willingly participated in bingo games, receiving relaxation and enjoyment in return for their small monetary contributions."

### Centre Promotes Successful Marriage

Ottawa—(RNS)—The Catholic Centre here says it has grown in 10 years into the largest academic promoter of successful marriages in the world.

Father Andrew L. Guay, O.M.I., director of the Centre, gives these facts and figures: More than 65,000 people around the world have taken the marriage courses devised by the Centre.

The Catholic Centre, says Father Guay, is really the Extension Department of Ottawa University.

The courses were designed by specialists and are not distributed indiscriminately. Each applicant for them must be vouched for by a priest.

Individuals taking the "marriage preparation" course pay \$10 for the 15 lessons. The costs \$15 to an engaged couple taking it together. Married persons pay \$7 for the 10-lesson course on "marriage fundamentals."

### Catholic Writer Dies In Prison

London—(RNS)—Dr. Laszlo Toth, a leading Hungarian Catholic journalist and a co-defendant at the Budapest trial of Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty in 1949, has died in prison according to the Vatican Radio.

Quoting from a Vienna dispatch of the Austrian CIP agency, the station stressed that it had no official confirmation of the imprisoned journalist's death. It did point out, however, that Dr. Toth, 75, had been reported in ill health for some time.

Dr. Toth was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment by the Communist court which imposed a life sentence on Cardinal Mindszenty.
