The Bishop predicted success for the campaign drive which will conclude on November 11 and also mark the 15th anniversary of his installation as Bishop of Rochester. Citing the motto, "In God we trust," he added, "He who puts his trust in God can be sure of final victory."

called the turnout of campaign workers "a tremendous expression of the magnitude of Catholic unity and purpose."

Recalling that the United States was founded by religious men, Glina said that "today there is a greater need for Christian education to oppose the foe of Communism."

He also pointed to the upsurge in high school enrollments, forecast for 1954, to underscore the critical need for more Catholic high schools.

Glina paid special tribute to members of the Rochester Special Gifts Committee headed by Frederick M. Tobin and Joseph L. Hockenos.

**THE REV.** Robert J. Gannon, S.J., president of Fordham University and now pastor of St. Ignatius Church in New York, headlined the speakers list.

He traced modern social ills to 19th century philosophers who destroyed the doctrine of the absolute truth.

"Men like Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes and educator John Dewey threw out the idea that some things were absolutely right and some things absolutely wrong," the Jesuit declared.

As a result, he explained, men today in politics, law and industry are seeking to do, not what is right, but what is smart," he said.

Father Gannon explained the history of the Jesuit Fathers who will establish the McQuaid High School and pledged that the Jesuits would give Rochester a good school.

**IN ANOTHER** address, the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Charles J. Mahoney, diocesan superintendent of schools, outlined Bishop Kearney's accomplishments since coming to the diocese in 1937. He cited the Bishop's noteworthy efforts for education, charity, enterprise and the general leadership of his people.

Monsignor Mahoney also presented the Bishop a framed tribute of prayers offered in his behalf by the children of the diocesan schools.

The Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, campaign manager, gave the workers final instructions on the procedure for seeking the pledges.

### Fake Papal Letter Cited By Communists

London—(RNS)—Bulgaria Today, organ of the Bulgarian Legation here, published an article in which a non-existent Papal encyclical was quoted to support Communist charges against Bishop Eugene Bossilkov, C.P., recently sentenced to death by a Sofia court.

**THE ARTICLE** was published to back up a booklet entitled "Criminals in Cassocks," issued by the legation and circulated by British Communists. The booklet attempts to "explain" the Sofia trial of Roman Catholic clergy.

Bulgaria Today alleged that on March 17, 1950, Pope Plus XII issued an encyclical to "Cardinals, legates and nuncios in all countries," in which he instructed them to "support unconditionally the policy of the U.S. against Communism and the People's Democracy."

**IT WAS CONFIRMED** here that no such encyclical was issued on the date mentioned. And, neither before nor since that date has Pope Plus used any words remotely similar to those attributed to him by the Communist paper.

### Fr. Harold Purcell Dies, Founded City For Negroes

Montgomery, Ala. — (NC) — Father Harold Purcell, founder of the five-million-dollar City of St. Jude here who died (Oct. 22) at the age of 72, had completed nearly 20 years in an apostolate to the Negro following a career as a priest-editor which had taken him to the very forefront of Catholic journalism.

**FROM BOYHOOD**, Father Purcell was deeply interested in the social and spiritual welfare of the Negro. He had shown this interest by assisting the Negro apostolate in Texas and North Carolina.

When he came here to found a community dedicated to St. Jude, "the Saint of the Impossible," he realized a long-dreamed ambition to arouse white American Catholics to the social and moral welfare needs of the Negroes.

With the exception of a Federal grant-in-aid for building the \$1,500,000 hospital completed last year, all of the projects in the City of St. Jude were paid for through private funds raised by the priest.

Father Purcell began his work here by opening a clinic in a slum area of the city then inaugurated the City of St. Jude by constructing a combination church-school and social center on the outskirts of Montgomery. A modern school was added in

1947, and then came the hospital last year.

**FATHER PURCELL** was born in Gerardville, Pa., and joined the Passionist Order in 1898. He was ordained in 1904. His first 17 years as a priest were devoted to giving missions and retreats, work which took him into all but six states, and into Canada.

Father Purcell was appointed in 1921 to found The Sign Magazine, a national Catholic monthly. He served in this capacity until 1934, and in the meantime was chosen vice-president of the Catholic Press Association of the United States and chairman of its Circulation Vigilance Committee.

**HE SIGNED** up to write for his magazine such distinguished literary figures as H. L. Hunt, and G. K. Chesterton. The publication became one of the leading Catholic periodicals.

Resigning from The Sign in 1934, Father Purcell received permission to leave the Passionist Order and to undertake his work among the Negroes here. He built the City of St. Jude under the direction of Bishop Thomas J. Toolen of Mobile.


