

### National 4th Degree Head Due At Elmira Initiation

A large group of Knights of Columbus will receive the honors of the Fourth Degree — Patriotic — in a ceremony to be conducted on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 2 at 2:30 p.m. in Duane Memorial Auditorium, Elmira.

In the evening at 6:30 p.m. the Exemplification banquet will be held for the new 4th Degree Knights and their ladies at the Mark Twain Hotel. It is planned for more than 350.

Speakers for the banquet include the Rt. Rev. Almer William J. Erlen, V.F., pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, Supreme Master of the Fourth Degree, William J. Mulligan of Hartford, Conn.

Mulligan is also Deputy Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus, comprising a total membership of nearly 900,000 at present in United States, Canada, Puerto Rico and the Philippines.

A MEMBER OF the Order for more than 25 years, Mulligan is a graduate of the Law School of Yale University and a member of the New York City Bar Association. He has been honored with the Degree of Doctor of Law by both Holy Cross and Fordham Universities.

For his outstanding work on behalf of the Catholic Church the late Pope Benedict XV honored him with the title of Knight of St. Gregory. The present Pope, Pius XII, made him a Knight of Malta in 1951 and authorized

For his efforts in the first World War, the Republic of France conferred the "Medaille De La Reconnaissance Francaise" which is rarely given to civilians. He is also a member of the Yale Club of Hartford, the Yale Club of New York City, Catholic Club of Hartford, Hartford Chamber of Commerce and an honorary member of the 69th Regiment of New York.

### \$2,000,000 Religious Center, Memorial Presented Cornell U. By Myron Taylor

Ithaca — (RNS) — An appeal for the world's religious groups to "enlist under one banner" to counter threats against peace was sounded here by Myron C. Taylor in formally presenting Cornell University with a new \$2,000,000 religious center and war memorial.

"Nothing but a common front with religion can save the world from catastrophe," he said. "Religion is the only force that can bind people together to resist evil influences and actions. It cannot be really effective unless all religions enlist under one banner and establish a common front inspired by faith in Almighty God."

Mr. Taylor said that his experience as representative to the Vatican for Presidents Roosevelt and Truman between 1939 and 1950 had strengthened his faith in "the ultimate triumph of a spiritual ideal."
