## Canada Drops Exchange Plan With Russians

Quebec City, Can. — (RNS) — A proposal to exchange students with Russia was dropped by the Canadian Federation of University Students when delegates from the Roman Catholic Universities of Laval and Montreal threatened to quit the organization.

The federation's resolutions committee had approved the exchange by a vote of 16 to 4. It was withdrawn when the Catholic students announced they would walk out if the plenary session adopted the proposal.

STUDENTS CALLED on Premier Maurice Duplessis of Quebec and placed the proposal before him. Mr. Duplessis warned them against it.

"You never know what you are going to get in return for a Canadian," he said. "I would never change a Canadian for a Russian. You would be sending a typical Canadian for the Russians to see and talk to, but you cannot know what the present Russian government will send here among us."

THE PREMIER said he could not understand why friendly relations should be maintained with "the murderers of freedom." When asked if a student exchange would not improve understanding between the two peoples, Mr. Duplessis replied: "If Russia wants to be known, it should drop the Iron Curtain."
