Priest, Ex-Newsman Heard Here

World Must Submit To God Declares Fr. Max Jordan

There is basically only one problem facing the world today and that problem has only one solution, the Rev. Max Jordan, internationally-known foreign correspondent, declared in a lecture at Nazareth College Monday afternoon.

The problem, he said, is man's rejection of God; the solution lies in his surrender to Divine WILL. Father Jordan has 30 years experience as a broadcaster and writer to his credit, having covered Europe for the National Broadcasting Co. and the National Catholic Welfare Conference news service.

A convert, he was ordained last year by Archbishop Aloisius J. Muench, Apostolic Nuncio, in the Benedictine Abbey church of Beuron, Germany. Now on a nationwide lecture tour, he also spoke at Cornell University Wednesday.

WARNING AGAINST the danger of simplification, he told his Nazareth College audience that most problems are complicated and do not lend themselves to easy solution. He noted, however, that the fundamental problems of all times have stemmed from man's attempt to ignore God.

Thus, he found that the Communists today are making the same mistake Adam made in Paradise. They are trying to improve their position in the world by themselves, pretending that God does not exist.

THE UPBRAID denoted the traditional Communist salute, symbolizes their defiance of God. Father Jordan observed, while Christ's challenge to man was accepted by His Mother when she said, "Be it done unto me according to Thy word."

In spite of the many technological advances in recent times, he maintained, "the world is more divided now than ever in its history." Modern means of transportation and communication have made possible "One World," he said, but spiritually and intellectually the world is divided into two camps which are "totally contrary."

reject the principle that religious education is all-important.

That is the heart of the matter and I commend it to those who have been lulled into talking about "segregation" when they mean secularism.

Having excluded religion from education, you may perhaps answer the following: What have you to offer as a substitute for moral and religious values as a basis for social and cultural unity? You either educate or diseducate. Tell us how you can educate in moral and religious values without educating in religion.

The Educational Policies Commission of the National Educational Association of School Administrators after a study early in 1951 on "Moral and Spiritual Values in Public Schools" gave us this as the moral norm of human conduct: "The approval of democratic culture."

They do not say, however, what democratic culture is, how the approval of democratic culture is given and above all - whence comes its right to approve its own morality.

The answers to these questions are the essence of your position and I should like very much to have them.

Finally, the future. This we are told is the great Soviet hope of the hour: the conquest of the world without firing a shot. What, in the absence of war, does secularism offer to oppose the Soviet conquest of the world? Specifically, what has it to offer today that is
