

That is the heart of the matter and I commend it to those who have been Iulled into talking about "segregation" when they mean secularism.

Having excluded religion from education, you may per-haps answer the following: What have you to offer as substitute for moral and re-ligious values as a basis for social and cultural unity? You either educate or diseducate. Tell us how you can educate in moral and religious values without educating in religion.

The Educational Policies Commission of the National Educational Association of School Administrators after a study early in 1951 on "Moral and Spiritual Values in Public Schools" gave us this as the moral norm of human conduct: "The approval of demogratic culture.

They do not say, however, what-democratic culture is, how the approval of democratic culture is given and—above all—whence comes its right to approve its own morality.

The answers to these questions are the essence of your position and I should like very much to have them. Finally, the future. This we




