Business Firms Asked To Aid New High School

Advantages to Elmira business men of the existence of a new Catholic high school in the city to be erected on lower Maple Ave. are being pointed out in a solicitation being made for their financial aid to the school.

An attractive four-page pamphlet entitled "What This New Elmira High School Means to You," attractively printed, has been prepared and distributed. The front page shows the architect's drawing of Notre Dame De Lourdes High School.

BUSINESS SUBJECTS will be taught in the new school, the pamphlet states and lists typewriting, bookkeeping, shorthand, office practice, secretarial practice, business mathematics and business law. These will be in addition to a high standard of secondary school subjects.

"Students will be trained," the pamphlet states "for the type of office work in which Elmira is interested. Graduates will be dependable, conscientious, self-sacrificing, and will be able to work with others."

As an asset the new high school, to cost more than \$1,300,000, will mean that another public high school will not have to be constructed.

THE PAMPHLET further states: "Besides taking the amount of \$1,300,000 from your tax bills, an income tax deductible contribution to this building fund will pay annual dividends to your company in the form of school tax savings each year."

"PRESENT SAVINGS:—The 1952-1953 public school appropriation for the City of Elmira is \$2,293,355. Total registration in public schools is 7,727. This figures out to \$296.90 per pupil. There are 2,092 students in parochial schools now operating in Elmira. Applying the cost of \$296.90 means an annual saving of \$621,114 to taxpayers.

"ADDITIONAL SAVINGS DUE TO NEW HIGH SCHOOL:—The new high school is designed for 700 students. Applying the average cost of \$296.90 per student means an annual saving of \$207,830 to taxpayers.

"SUMMARY OF TAX SAVINGS:—\$621,114 now save annually and \$207,830 to be saved totals \$828,944. This means a total annual tax savings of \$15,033 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. Breaking down the \$15,033 rate means \$6.13 per \$1000 of assessed valuation is saved annually from direct school taxes, and \$8.90 from indirect school taxes which you pay in the form of state aid. These savings apply not only to your company, but also the assessed valuation of property in Elmira owned by your employees.

The Elmira solicitation is in addition to the Bishop's Jubilee High School Fund campaign conducted successfully in Elmira.

Diocesan-Wide Collection Of Clothing Centered In Parish

Every parish will be a collection center in the diocesan-wide Thanksgiving Clothing Collection for Korea and refugees of Europe, the Near East and Far East during Thanksgiving Week, Nov. 23 to 30.

The collection was given the approval of His Excellency Bishop Kearney in a letter to the pastors, last week.

Details for the collection were outlined by the Rev. Louis J. Hohman appointed director of the campaign in the diocese by the Bishop.

In the Diocese of Rochester, collection of clothing, shoes and blankets will be made in each of the parishes. Anyone having any of these items which are still usable may bring them to his parish church or a place designated by the pastor.

THE MATERIAL collected will be sorted, packed and shipped to the War Relief Center, in Masspeh, Long Island, from where it will be shipped to the destitute peoples of war-torn countries all over the world.

Regional directors have been appointed to conduct the campaign outside the Rochester Diocese. They are: Rev. Robert Fennerty for Geneva, Rev. Daniel Hogan, Corning; Rev. Charles McCarthy, Auburn, and Rev. Joseph McNamara, Elmira.

School children are being asked to do their share in this charitable project by assisting in bringing the clothing to the parish centers.

"IF EVERYONE does just a little," Father Hohman said, "we in America can lift millions of despairing people in foreign lands to their rightful dignity as human beings."

"We in America have been blessed by God with a great abundance even to the point of wastefulness. Today the world is too small for us to forget or ignore the terrible plight of millions of refugees, homeless and destitute. To do so would have to turn our backs upon them deliberately in a manner anything but Christian."

"What better way do we have to show our appreciation for the great gift of America than by making this a real Thanksgiving?" Father Hohman asked.

Pointing the need for the collection, the War Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Service announced:

In Korea, people facing their third winter of war, with less even than they had to carry them through the past two winters.

In Western Germany some 15,000 refugees per month were and still are, being added to the one and one-half million who have already fled from the Soviet Zone. The several hundred thousand refugees in shelters in the Western sector of Berlin are in particularly dire need.

Austria has its refugee problems and is faltering badly on the road to economic recovery. The British colony of Hong Kong bulges with more than a million refugees from Red China. An estimated 125,000 displaced persons — the unwanted "hard core" of the European DP problem — remain in camps in Germany, Austria, Trieste and Italy.
