**Far East Authorities To Debate Korea Situation In Thomas More Series**

"Was Korea Necessary?" will be debated by Major George Field Elliot and Frank Gibney in the Thomas More Lecture Forum Series at Rochester Chamber of Commerce, Wednesday, Dec. 3 at 8:15 p.m.

The Thomas More Lecture Forum sponsored by the Catholic Courier Journal is under the direction of the Very Rev. Magr. John S. Mandall, managing editor.



The debate, a departure in the Forum series, will bring together Major Elliot, a distinguished lecturer, author and newspaper columnist and Frank Gibney, a dynamic speaker and an astute student of the Orient.

YEARS OF keen political and military analysis, intimate personal acquaintance with the men responsible for America's security and defense have enabled Major Elliot to call the turn in world affairs.

He knows what is happening behind the scenes, as well as on the stage, and he knows how to make his knowledge understandable to his readers. "He will take issue with Mr. Gibney on the benefits of our knowledge of world affairs," Monsignor Randall said.

FRANK GIBNEY has packed an amazing personal history into his brief 30 years. It is said. Experience in the Far East and in Europe have made him an authority well qualified to debate the efficacy of the United States foreign policy.

"A veteran of action in the Pacific during World War II, he served successively with United Press and Times as correspondent in Europe and finally returned to the Far East as Tokyo Bureau Chief of Time, Life and Fortune.

**Dedication Set Dec. 14 For New Chapel At Iola**

Dedication of a new chapel for Catholic services in Iola Sanatorium will take place Sunday, Dec. 14 in connection with similar ceremonies of the other two faiths according to the Rev. Eugene N. Golding, Catholic chaplain at the Sanatorium.

Father Golding who is also Catholic Chaplain at the Monroe County Penitentiary and Rochester State Hospital said, today that the dedication on Dec. 14 will be the fourth time a new step has been made in the institution for Catholic worship.



Ordned in 1922, Father Golding took up the work of chaplain at the various institutions after serving as assistant pastor at St. Patrick's, Mt. Morris and St. Ambrose, Rochester.

He outlined the history of the Catholic chapel at Iola from its start in an old barn accommodating ten patients, "and these not welcomed in the neighborhood" to the Iola of today, the Monroe County Tuberculosis Sanatorium which is a multimillion dollar institution. It has the complete facilities of the most modern hospital.

In 1917, the infirmary building was erected and Mass was celebrated in the sun-parlor on the first floor. In 1928, the chapel was moved to larger quarters. For a quarter of a century the doctors, nurses, staff attendants and patients have made good use of it for Sunday and Holy Days, for First Fridays and Lenten Devotions.

COORDINATION and cooperation extended by the various staffs to the church for the past 25 years have exceeded that for which anyone might hope, Father Golding said.

Once again, new arrangements and improvements are offered through the courtesy and kindness of "the popular and genial superintendent," Dr. John M. McMillan. "To make it nearer to us, two hand carved statues from the mountains of the Tyrol will be placed on each side of the Catholic Altar," Father Golding said.

The name "Iola" was taken from an Indian maiden and signifies "do not be discouraged."

AFTER 43 YEARS, Iola now accommodate close to 400 patients at one time. It processes 23,000 persons through its clinic each year. It is equipped to care for all the needs of the patient including treatment and surgery for other afflictions should they be contracted during their hospitalization.

"Therefore," Father Golding said, "there is some substance to the name 'Iola'."

Over the years, the priest noted, there has come a tremendous and drastic change in the views of T.B. Time was when the White Plague looked upon the youth of the land.

Visitors to Iola will bear witness to the modern consideration of how advanced information has destroyed old superstitions and unnecessary fear. Solarium and ultra-violet ray treatments have been replaced with the use of the newly developed drugs. Besides streptomycin, para-amino-salicylic acids in pill form and isonicotinic acid have altered and made a new approach.

THE INCREASE in surgery from pneumothorax to lobectomy and the happy results from the same make the institution hardly a sanatorium, but actually and truly a first class hospital.

"Some 25 years ago we had 150 children in the religious classes," Father Golding recalled. "Today we have three. The resident cottages for ambulatory patients, libraries, dental, medical dispensary, beauty parlors, barber shop and interesting tunnels against the elements of the season's weather and the actual circumstances of life as it is, does not distort too much the (Continued on Page 2A)

**Bishop To Speak At First Friday Club Anniversary**
