Bishop From India Asks Funds Here For Seminary

To stem the tide of Communism in Asia threatening to engulf his homeland, Bishop Leonard Raymond of Allahabad, India said to do this, hundreds of native priests must be trained.

The native India Bishop was in Rochester on Friday to visit His Excellency Bishop Kearney. The two Bishops met in the Chancery in Columbus Civic Center.

Funds for expanding a seminary already in his diocese are urgently needed, Bishop Raymond told reporters following the conference with Bishop Kearney.

A NATIVE of Karachi, India, and a classmate and long time friend of the newly designated first Cardinal from India, Archbishop Valerian Gracias of Bombay, Bishop Raymond also conferred here with Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

In excellent English, Bishop Raymond explained that he has 36 students now being trained in Allahabad but the urgent need is for accommodations for the training of a total of 60 students.

On his brief visit to the city, the Bishop of India was accompanied by the Rev. Dr. Edward Lintz of Nazareth College faculty.

The Bishop's brother, Rev. Stephen Raymond studied at the Catholic University in Washington.

Bishop Byrne Mass Held In Pusan

Pusan, Korea — (NC) — A Solemn Pontifical Requiem High Mass was celebrated for Bishop Patrick Byrne, Apostolic Delegate to Korea, by Bishop John Choe, Vicar Apostolic of Taegu, in Central Catholic Church in Pusan, in the presence of Bishop Paul Ro, Vicar Apostolic of Seoul; Msgr. George Carroll, Apostolic Administrator of Pyeng Yang; representatives of the American, French and British embassies and the Korean government.

Bishop Byrne was captured by the communists in June, 1950, and has not been heard from since. He was announced as presumed dead by the Vatican in a recent statement.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will be one of five Bishops participating in the Manhattan observance of the Chair of Unity Octave, according to an NCWC News Service dispatch from New York.

This octave of prayer, (Jan. 18-25), for the reunion of Christendom will be observed in the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, New York City, which will be host to the forty-first solemn observance sponsored by the Friars of Graymoor, Garrison, N. Y.

With the permission of Bishop Kearney, the solemn observance will be conducted in St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, by the Friars of the Atonement who are in charge of St. John's Atonement Seminary, Montour Falls.

A Solemn Mass for Christian Unity in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, will climax the observance. The Very Rev. Angelus Delahunt, S.A., Superior General of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement of St. Christopher's Inn, will preach the sermon.
