It will be a nice project for some of these household winter days.

And it will be a consoling thought that my blind and purposeless hoarding will result in some body being shielded from the cold winds of a cold world.

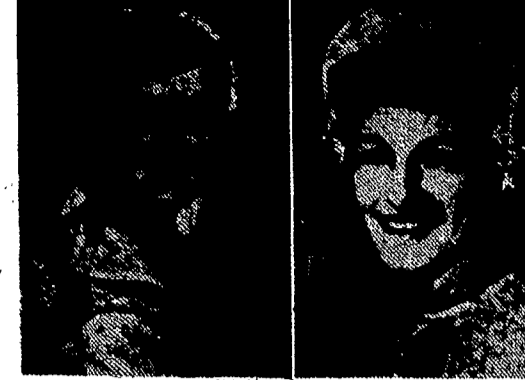

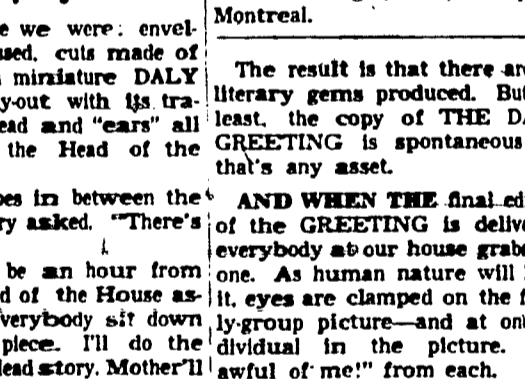

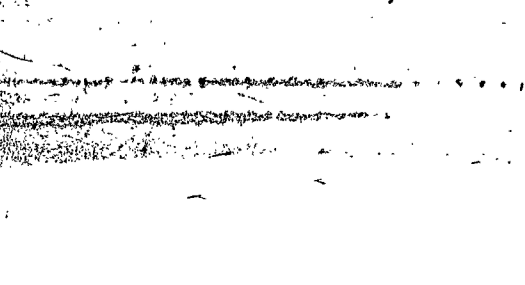
