Monsignor Lambert's Work Earns Praise Of 2 Bishops

Two members of the Hierarchy paid tribute to Monsignor Gerald C. Lambert, retiring director of Rochester Catholic Charities, on his 19-year career in the field of social welfare service at a testimonial dinner held Thursday evening of last week in the Sheraton Hotel ballroom.

About 350 persons representing a cross section of Catholic and social welfare circles in Rochester were present to hear Monsignor Lambert eulogized on his retirement from directorship of diocesan Catholic Charities and the Columbus Civic Center, the diocesan building.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney with whom the guest of honor has worked 15 years and His Excellency Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse, former director of the Charities and Center under whom Monsignor Lambert laid the foundation for his work in the welfare field, paid tributes opening and closing the program.

Bishop Foery recalling the years in which he was associated with Monsignor Lambert in the Charities commended highly the work of the younger priest and stressed the courage and perseverance demonstrated by him in the management and financing of the Columbus Civic Center.

THE 15 YEARS in which Monsignor Lambert had worked as Charities director under him were fruitful ones, Bishop Kearney declared. Bishop Kearney cited particularly the spiritual consolation brought by Monsignor Lambert to the orphan, the sick, the aged and the youth of the diocese.

Climaxing the program was presentation of a 12-page silver service for Monsignor Lambert's use in the rectory of St. Monica's Church where he will now devote his full time as pastor. The role Monsignor Lambert played in founding Camp Stella Maris, and his unusual faculty for dealing with bankers were recalled by Bernard E. Pinucane, speaking for the laity. St. Joseph's Villa, outstanding in the country, was a Monsignor Lambert project, he said.

The Monsignor's capability in cooperating with the Rochester Community Chest and the other welfare agencies in the community was praised by Richard P. Miller, manager of the Rochester Community Chest, who spoke for the community. Monsignor Lambert's spiritual approach to the Chest problems was particularly cited by Miller.

SPEAKERS WERE presented by the Rev. Arthur E. Katigan who is succeeding Monsignor Lambert in directing the Charities and the Columbus Civic Center.

The guest of honor in expressing his thanks paid tribute to the cooperation he had received from all and particularly touched on Bishop Kearney's assisting in "saving one institution."

A souvenir booklet of the occasion recited in pictures and in historical data, the record made by the guest of honor from his

ordination in 1929 to his retirement from the social welfare and charitable fields.
