

Brockport Woman Heads State CDA Seminary Drive

New York State Court, Catholic Daughters of America, has set \$20,000 as the goal of its 1953 Seminary Fund Drive, according to Miss Marie C. Curry of Bellerose, L. I., state representative.

Announcing the opening she reported that \$25,000 was given by the Court in 1952 toward the education of worthy young men for the priesthood.

In addition to the usual distribution of \$17,500, or \$2,500 to each of the Bishops of the state, an additional \$7,500 was given to Cardinal Spellman for the North American College in Rome.

Miss Curry said it is hoped the 1953 response will be sufficient to enable the Court to make its usual donation to the state's Bishops and a gift of \$2,500 for the North American College.

She said the latter amount would complete a \$15,000 burse there for the education of a young man from New York State, the recipient to be chosen by Cardinal Spellman.

CHAIRMAN OF THE 1953 drive, which will continue through April, is Mrs. Mary Donahue of Brockport. She succeeds Mrs. Jane Benzing of Mount Vernon, state treasurer.

Unity Prayer Octave Fills Elmira Church

The Chair of Unity Octave Observance sponsored by the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement of St. John's Atonement Seminary in Montour Falls from Jan. 18 to 25 has attracted capacity congregations to St. Patrick's Church, Elmira.

The estimate Monday night was approximately 930 persons.

The Octave of prayer for Christian Unity will be closed with Solemn Benediction on Sunday, Jan. 25, with Elmira Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, furnishing a Guard of Honor.

Opening the Octave on Sunday, Jan. 18 was the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. Brien, V.F. pastor of St. Patrick's, with the sermon on "The Return of the Other Sheep to the Fold of Peter" by the Very Rev. Alexander Beaton, S.A., Guardian of St. John's Seminary.

"When we pray for the return of the lost sheep to the fold of unity during this octave," the Very Rev. Alexander Beaton, S.A., Guardian of St. John's Atonement Seminary, said in the sermon opening the Octave, "We do not pray for the unity of the Catholic faith, but for those who have strayed outside the fold of Peter."

"Christ still thirsts for these separated souls, and asks us to pray and sacrifice that they may be one again. But His thirst today is for a world which has gone half pagan."

"Fifteen or twenty years ago one could discuss religion with many God-loving and God-fearing people — people who live righteous lives, who lived according to the standards of the commandments, who believe in the divinity of Christ, people who were familiar with the Sacred Scriptures."

"Today, however, materialistic and pagan living has paralyzed the minds of many, and in their confused state of mind they cling only to a belief in God and to a few general moral principles. I am convinced that we must consider this class of people as a religious cult to be numbered among the other sheep."

Georgetown Receives Cancer Study Gift

Washington—(NC)—For the fourth consecutive year the Georgetown University Medical Center has received a \$25,000 gift from the Alexander and Margaret Stewart Trust to carry on the Home Care Service program for cancer victims. Father Edward B. Bunn, S.J., university president, has announced.

The home-care program, begun in 1950, provides the equivalent of hospital care in terms of medical, nursing and medical social services for pre-terminal and terminal cancer patients who remain at home. The Stewart trust gift will cover home-care expenses for 1953, according to Father Paul A. McNally, S. J., medical center director.

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
