

### HN Men Honor 30 Members At St. Ann Memorial Rite

Hornell — Thirty members of St. Ann's Holy Name Society who died during 1952 were commemorated at a candlelight service Sunday afternoon in the church.

The Rev. John L. Coonan, moderator, presided. As names of the deceased members were read, candles were lighted in the church sanctuary and prayers offered. Father Coonan said: "It is consoling to realize that we can pray for the souls of others. We should profit by this memorial service by considering that we too must die, so we should be prepared at all times to meet God."

THE SERMON was given by the Rev. Robert MacNamara, assistant pastor. He compared the history of the Jews, who wandered for forty years looking for the Promised Land with that of a human soul in its relationship to God.

"The years of wandering are like a lifetime of trials, hardships and temptations," he said. "The trials are endured and the soul passes through, not a river, but death, from this life to the next. Before it can enter into the Promised Land, it too must undergo a period of fighting and suffering and a cleansing. This is what we call purgatory, and many a soul is in the midst of that battle now."

### Personal Problems Burden Bishop Sheen 'Fan Mail'

New York — "I have just received your letter in which you tell me that your daughter is suffering from an incurable disease and that death is hovering over her. For your consolation I bid you to go to another Mother, who when her Child was 40 days old was told that He was marked for death."

**THIS ADVICE** from Auxiliary Bishop Fulton J. Sheen of New York to grief-stricken parents in answer to one of the thousands of letters received weekly as a result of the prelate's television talks.

Samples of the Bishop's replies and a description of how such mail is handled appears in the January 24 edition of Collier's magazine in an article entitled "Bishop Sheen Answers His Fan Mail" by Howard Cohn.

To handle the 8,000 letters a week in response to his TV program, Bishop Sheen uses a clerical staff of 35 people who sort and examine the letters, the story reports. This staff acknowledges compliments and answers routine requests for information. Letters asking for advice on individual problems are handled by Msgr. Charles McBride of Father Joseph Tennant of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. The "most significant and urgent queries" are passed to the Bishop for his personal response.

**FOUR RECENT REPLIES** on problems of a son frequently brought to the Bishop's attention are included in the Collier's article. These are:

"Consolation to a wife who has lost her husband; advice to a woman who plans to leave her husband because he is an alcoholic; encouragement to a despairing sinner, and sympathy to a woman whose child has been stricken by an incurable disease."

This child came from God through grace," he advised the letter couple. "You must be sure that it goes back through you; that is, through your sweet surrender of will to that of the Father's will."

**NO MARRIAGE IS** the parents' obligation to provide the way for their children to find their child in the Divine Child Who first showed the way for His parents.

To the wife of the alcoholic, the Bishop wrote: "If your husband had some serious illness such as syphilis, you would not desert him but would lavish him with tender and affectionate care. Now that you husband has a mental illness, why abandon him? Or do you intend to send him to the insane asylum?"

### Vatican Lists Prayer Goals For 1953

Vatican City — (NC) — The 1953 intentions for the Apostleship of Prayer, the annual list in which the Holy Father sets forth monthly intentions for which Catholics throughout the world are asked to pray, are headed by prayer for the persecuted so that they may remain strong in their faith and for the return to the church of those who have strayed.

The intentions for each month are as follows:

**January** — That all those who strayed may return to the church with hearts free from any reserve; **February** — That the persecuted may remain strong in their faith even unto death; **March** — That the general and special intentions of Pope Pius XII may be granted; **April** — For the world's 1,400 Catholic bishops and their pastoral activity; **May** — That the dangers to faith and morals may be removed from films; **June** — That those who are oppressed by worry or anguish may find relief in the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

**July** — That the dignity of the human person may be everywhere respected; **August** — That conjugal life may be conducted on a basis of the laws of God; **September** — That the laws of God may be observed in the economic field; **October** — That lay Catholics may feel and follow the call to the Apostolate; **November** — That a quick end to the housing shortage may be found; **December** — That the action of the Vatican for the pacification of peoples may meet with success.

### Vatican Press Officer Killed

Vatican City — (NC) — Msgr. Federico Fiorelli, well-known member of the Vatican press office, died (Jan. 9) as a result of injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile in front of the Porta Santi Anna gate of the Vatican.

Monignor Fiorelli, who was a canon of St. Peter's Basilica, was much beloved by all of the reporters covering Rome. Press people throughout the world—many of whom got to know him during the Holy Year — remember him for his gentle courtesy and unflinching good nature.

The prelate, who died three days after being hit by the car, was returning to the press office for overtime work in connection with the Consistory of the College of Cardinals when the accident happened.
