### Priest Ousted From China By Reds To Visit Kin Here

Tokyo — (NC)—Ousted from Red China in September, 1952, after months of torture, a 55-year-old priest left here for the United States where he will spend two months before proceeding to his native Ireland.

He is Father Maurice Kavanaugh, C.M., who had spent 25 years in China when he was arrested in July, 1951, at Peking, on charges of being a "spy" and a "secret agent." On one occasion, he was forced to stand for 32 hours while being questioned by the communists regarding his supposed espionage activities.

(A cousin of the Vincentian priest, Patrick J. Kavanaugh, 25 Oriole St., told the Catholic Courier Journal, this week, that he expects a visit but has not heard from him as yet). He is also a cousin of Public Safety Commissioner Andrew J. Kavanaugh of Wilmington, Del.

Father Kavanaugh, who spent several months in Hong Kong recuperating from the brutal treatment experienced during 14 months of imprisonment, was for many years pastor of St. Joseph's Church, one of the most famous of the four historic churches in Peking.

When Father Kavanaugh denied the allegations made against him, his arms were tied behind his back and he was forced to remain standing without moving. His arms, hands, feet and legs became swollen. The prison guards then forced him to squat in Chinese fashion, allowing only his feet to touch the floor. As a result of having broken his knees earlier in life, he found the posture extremely painful.

**KEPT IN THIS** position for 84 hours, Father Kavanaugh had a halter placed about his neck to jerk him erect whenever he fell over. Each time he was lifted from the floor by his ears or by his hair. Eventually he lost consciousness and became delirious.

Critically ill, he was taken to a hospital for 20 days, but later was subjected to repeated questionings and finally sentenced to death.
