

Formosa Student At Nazareth College Hails President's Move For Island

President Eisenhower's order releasing the Seventh Fleet, a highlight of his "State of the Union" address Monday, has the endorsement of a Nazareth College junior whose interest in the matter is more than casual. She is Miss Bessie Huang, a resident of Formosa, the island stronghold of Chiang Kai-Shek. Her father is attached to the Chinese Nationalist government there.

Eisenhower's cancellation of the orders issued by former President Truman in June, 1950, is considered his first move to step up military pressure on the Chinese Reds to achieve peace in Korea and throughout Asia. Under the Truman orders, the U. S. fleet has prevented Nationalist troops on Formosa from raiding the Red China mainland.

LIMITING ACTION to Korea, Bessie believes, will not be enough to stop communism in Asia, since Red strength is chiefly on the mainland. According to her, the non-Communist Chinese have at least one thing in common with millions of Americans: they like Ike. The 20-year-old biology major indicated that his foreign policy move would not lessen that fondness.

Bessie was born in Paris, where her parents first met. Both were there in diplomatic service. When Bessie was only two months old, her father was transferred to Nanking. Thereafter, depending upon his assignments, they lived in Sumatra, Singapore, Calcutta, Chungking, Peiping, Nanking, and returned to France for three years. Her parents now live in Taipei, Formosa, at 119, CHI Chang Lu, Chang Nan Li, Hsin Tein.

A SCHOLARSHIP brought Bessie to Nazareth College in 1951, and she has been heading dean's lists ever since. Besides being an excellent biology student, she is an accomplished violinist and artist.

While she plans to return to Formosa after she completes her education, her parents have advised her to remain in the United States until conditions in the orient settle. She is taking a pre-medical course, but may do advanced work in biology after graduation.

English is no obstacle to Bessie. She studied the language at the British school in Singapore, at schools in France, and at the Sisters of Providence school in Taipeing, Formosa.

After graduation from the latter, she applied for an American scholarship to the National Catholic Welfare Commission in Washington. Father Mao, then

with the N.C.W.C., now a missionary in Formosa, recommended her to Nazareth.

The Rochester diocesan college for women, conducted by Sisters of St. Joseph, sponsors two foreign students annually. This year

the other is Miss Yvonne Wong, of Hong Kong.

Their names are the same, according to Miss Huang, but Chinese regional differences in pronunciation account for the different English spellings.

Fr. William Boland's Rites To Be Held In Rochester

The funeral of the Rev. William T. J. Boland, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church (Old Cathedral) in Leavenworth, Kansas, who died in Kansas, Monday, Feb. 2, 1953, will be held in his native Rochester on the return of the body from Kansas.

Father Boland who was also president of the Diocesan High School Board in the Diocese of Kansas City in Kansas, attended St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester and completed his education for the priesthood in Kansas. He was ordained in June, 1923.

The former Rochester priest's two brothers, Edward J. Boland residing at the family home, 256 Parkway and Michael F. Boland went to Kansas to accompany the body home. Arrangements there were in charge of the Rev. J. Kenneth Sparlock, pastor of Blessed Sacra-

ment Church, Kansas City in Kansas, a long-time friend of Father Boland's.

Arrangements for services here were not completed as this issue went to press.

3 Sisters Of St. Joseph Paid Final Tribute

Funeral services for three Sisters of St. Joseph were held during the week, at Nazareth convent, Pittsford. Tributes were paid to Sister M. Saint Agnes, Sister M. Vincentia and Sister M. Melita.

Last Saturday, the Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered for Sister M. Melita Eschery, Rev. Russell Pendergast, C.S.B., was celebrant, assisted by Rev. L. Edward McManus, deacon, Rev. Roy B. Morphy, sub-deacon, Rev. William H. Shannon, Master of Ceremonies, and Rev. Edward J. Lintz, Thurifer. Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph H. Gefell and Rt. Rev. Magr. Louis Edelman were also present in the sanctuary; Monsignor Gefell gave the last blessing at the grave.

A native of Seneca Falls, Sister Melita entered the Sisters of Saint Joseph in 1900. She taught in a number of the diocesan schools including Holy Apostles and St. Augustine's in Rochester, Immaculate Conception, Ithaca, and St. Theodore's, Gates. She was also principal of St. Mary's School, Waterloo, for two years.

Sister Melita is survived by several nieces and nephews.

'Parish' Topic Picked For Discussion By 250 Clubs In Diocese During Lent

More than 250 Discussion Clubs organized in the Diocese of Rochester for Lenten discussion in 1953 will concentrate on "the parish" according to the Rev. Albert H. Schnacky, diocesan director, Confraternity of Christian Doctrine arranging for the clubs.

The pamphlet chosen for this year's study is entitled: "Our Parish: House of God and Gate of Heaven," by the Rev. H. A. Reinhold, diocesan director of Christian Doctrine, Diocese of Yakima, Washington. This pamphlet was used ten years ago in the Lenten series.

"AS WE ARE proud of our hometown, so we should be proud of our own parish," Father Reinhold said of the program for study.

He pointed out that a conscientious study of this pamphlet will make Discussion Club members parish-conscious, and thus, parish-bound. It is a study of the parish altar, the parish confessional, the parish baptistry, the parish sick-call.

Parish priests are familiar with the workings of a Discussion Club, Father Schnacky said, this week. The members, ten at the most, gather once a week for an hour at the homes of one of the members. One member is chosen as "leader" and directs the discussion.

EACH member, Father Schnacky said, should have a copy of the pamphlet and read the Chapter beforehand. Then, at the meeting, the members will take turns reading the text, and then also take turns answering the questions at the end of the Chapter. Difficult questions and problems will be referred to the parish priest.

Membership certificates certifying the indulgences gained will be issued to members who complete the six weeks of discussion.

Father Cody, St. Bernard Grad Named Monsignor

A member of the 1923 class of St. Bernard's Seminary, the Rev. John J. Cody of Dodge City, Kansas, was among three priests of his diocese to be elevated to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor by His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Monsignor Cody, a native of Ireland, was ordained in 1923 and served as an Army chaplain in World War II. He is now a reserve chaplain and pastor of St. Rose of Lima Parish, Great Bend, Kans.

Bishop Kearney spoke at a General Session in the school auditorium. His Excellency said for a student to go to a secular college was turning her back on the Redeemer. He commended the loyalty of the alumnae and said that each would naturally say her college was the best. The fact that Christ is present in the Blessed Sacrament on each Catholic College campus is the real standard for prospective students to consider, he said.
