

Corpus Christi Women Set Jubilee Theme For Dinner

Balance Power For Peace, Urges Military Analyst

Hanson Baldwin, military editor of the New York Times, emphasized the restoration of a balance of power as "the only way out" of the tense international situation, in addressing the audience at the Thomas More Lecture Forum held last Monday evening in the Chamber of Commerce.

Baldwin, a Pulitzer Prize winning author, stated that "We must rearm Japan and Germany so the world can establish a balance of power to deal with Russia."

President Eisenhower fired the first shot in the cold war to win Germany and establish a balance of power against Russia, he said, when the new chief executive asked Congress to repudiate secret agreements governing the boundaries of that nation.

After World War II, Baldwin explained, "vacuums of power" were created in areas of Europe and Asia and the United States and Russia emerged as "super-states."

Establishment of only two dominant powers in the world "historically has always led to conflicts," he asserted.

It was his opinion, Baldwin said, that Russia is not planning a "shooting war" in the foreseeable future, but the new administration faces a long period of tension.

He believes that if a balance of power were established, Russia would withdraw.

Brig. Gen. Alfred H. Doud introduced Hanson to the assembly. The Thomas More Lecture Forum is sponsored by The Catholic Courier-Journal.

Next scheduled speaker is Dr. Benjamin Fine, educational editor of the New York Times, who will speak on "The Major Problem in American Education." Dr. Fine's talk is listed for Tuesday, March 10.
