

25th Annual Retreat Set For Mercy High Students

This "Retreat Re-Hash," introduced last year, will be distributed at noon each day and will contain highlights of the daily talks, news of retreat progress and timely suggestions for motivation and application for retreat resolutions.

TWO CONFERENCES will be given each morning and one in the afternoon followed by Benediction. Students will return to their homerooms for spiritual reading and "quiet projects" like mission work on stamps and bandages. The rosary, meditations and private devotions before the Blessed Sacrament will complete the day's varied schedule for each student.

Preparing the ground for hearty student cooperation, the Rev. Richard Torney, Mercy chaplain emphasized the need of "carrying the retreat spirit home" and "keeping the mind tuned to Almighty God even while away from school". He urged the student body to plan quiet evenings at home, spiritual reading and extra prayers each evening and earlier retiring.
