

### Legion Of Mary Unit At St. Anne's In 14th Year Records 700 Meetings

The 700th consecutive weekly Praesidium, Comfoter of the meeting is the record of the Afflicted of the Diocesan Legion of Mary, now in its 14th year at St. Anne's Parish, Rochester. Begun in May, 1939, under the direction of Rev. George J. Schmitt, its 18 members continue their apostolic work under the present pastor, the Rev. William Naughton.

Just 700 times has the statue of Our Lady stood at the head of the round table surrounded by her Legionaries as they pray. "Who is she, that cometh forth as the morning rising fair as the moon, bright as the sun, terrible as an army set in battle array."

**OBJECT OF THE Legion of Mary** is the sanctification of its members by prayer and actions of the lay apostolate. Gathering together every week of the year their meeting is a happy combination of prayer, spiritual guidance of the priest-director, and the members' reports of the activities of the past week.

Regular and punctual attendance at the weekly meeting is the prime duty. The Legionary believes the meeting is to his work as the root is to the flower. For him the work must represent some definite, active duty assigned by the Praesidium, not something dictated by the pleasure of the individual Legionary.

The performance of the weekly work obligation should be "substantial." That is, the Legionary should aim to spend a couple of hours a week at it. This work is to be done in closest union with Mary. It must be regarded as an essential aim of that work to instill into those who are the object of it, a knowledge of Mary and a true love of her.

**TO THE PRIEST,** the Legion gives the respect and obedience which are owing to lawful superiors. Its apostolate is built upon the fact that the main channels of grace are the Mass and the Sacraments, of which the priest is the essential minister.

All the strivings of that apostolate must have in view this great end: The bringing of the divinely appointed nourishment to the multitude. It follows that a first principle of legionary action must be the bringing of the priest to the people, not always in person, but everywhere in influence and in understanding.

This is the essential idea of the legion apostolate. As Bishop Dougherty, the first Bishop of Yakima, Washington, said, "Any priest who conscientiously reads every page of the Handbook of

### 15,000 See Cardinal Leger Offer Mass

Montreal, Que.—(NC)—Church and State joined in an impressive tribute to His Eminence Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, here.

The occasion was the first Pontifical Mass at which he officiated for all the public.

THE PUBLIC MASS was held in historic Notre Dame Church which accommodates some 15,000 persons, and every seat in the body of the church and the two-tiered galleries was filled.

Gathered about the Cardinal were Archbishop Idebrando Antonutti, Apostolic Delegate to Canada, eight other archbishops, 37 bishops, representatives of two other archbishops and seven other bishops.

Occupying places of honor in the church were Gaspard Fauteux, Lieutenant Governor of Quebec; Federal Postmaster General Alcide Cote, who represented the Prime Minister of Canada, Louis St. Laurent; the Premier of Quebec, Maurice Duplessis; the Federal Minister of Defense, Brooke Claxton; the Federal Minister of Finance, Douglas Abbott; other members of the federal and Quebec Parliaments; Camille Houde, Mayor of Montreal, and members of the City Council of Montreal.

FOLLOWING the Mass the two Auxiliaries of Montreal, Bishop Conrad Chaumont, speaking in French, and Bishop Lawrence Whelan, speaking in English, expressed on behalf of all the people of the diocese their tribute of respect and homage to Montreal's first Cardinal.
