High School Art Contest Winners To Get Gold Keys

Scholastic Magazine, co-sponsored by Sibley, Lindsay and Curr Company, will hold the eleventh exhibition of high school art in the Fourth Floor Gallery of Sibley's store, from Feb. 21 to March 7.

Pupils attending public, parochial or private high schools in Central Western New York are eligible to submit art work.

Student entries receiving Key awards in Rochester will be forwarded to Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, to compete for a place in the National Scholastic Art Exhibition to be held there in May.

There are 28 classifications, ranging from pictorial art, design and crafts, to photography.

THE LOCAL or regional award consists of a gold Scholastic Key. Only in Pittsburgh will cash prizes be awarded.

In each Scholastic Region, at least one scholarship will be awarded to the high school senior submitting the best portfolio of art work. There are 82 accredited art schools throughout this country who are offering 103 scholarships. Seven young people from the Rochester Region are competing for scholarships.

The gold keys will be presented to the winning students, Saturday, Feb. 21, at 3:00 p. m., at a Key Awards Ceremony, to be held in Sibley's Sixth Floor Recreation Center.

IN ROCHESTER, 34 judges, all of whom are creative artists, craftsmen and teachers of art, selected the work. Seventeen of these judges were from out of town.

Each afternoon and four evenings during the exhibition, demonstrations will be conducted in the fourth floor gallery of the store, by pupils of the art classes of high schools in and around Rochester.

Italians Honor Helsinki Church

Helsinki—(RNS)—A memorial plaque, presented by the Italian colony, was unveiled at the Catholic Church of St. Henrik here in the presence of Bishop William Cobben, Vicar Apostolic of Finland and Paolo Vita-Finzi, Italian Minister to Finland.

The plaque commemorates Countess Leopoldina Ciecognia who in 1860 helped found St. Henrik's church.

Designed by Natale Leod of Florence, Italy, it portrays a scene from the Finnish epic, Kalevala, which describes the last journey of St. Henrik, Finland's first Catholic bishop.

Catholics in Finland, a predominantly Lutheran country, number about 2,000 located in four parishes. Before the Reformation, the Catholic Church had up to 4,000 parishes in the country.
