

Bishon Casev's consecration will be the first such ceremony to be held in the Sacred Heart Church which Pope Pius XII last summer raised from the rank of pro-cathedral to Cathedral of the Diocese of Rochester.

Bishop Kearney was installed as fifth Bishop of Rochester in the present Sacred Heart Church on November 11, 1937 when he consecrated a bishop in St. Pat-Sen. Wiley announced that no rick's Cathedral in New York public hearings would be held on City on Oct. 28, 1932.

Last episcopal consecration the committee would accept held in Rochester was that of statements from individuals or Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse. He was elevated to the Hierarchy on August 18, 1937 in Rochester's old St. Patrick's Cathedral which was sold to the Eastman Kodak Company in the same year and subsequently


