

Mother Seton Example Told To Student Body Of Nurses

Rev. Salvator M. Burgio, C.M., Vice Postulator, who represents the Mother Seton Guild in Emmitsburg, Md., spoke to the student body of nurses at St. Mary's Hospital on Monday, Feb. 23.

Sister Martina, administrator of the hospital, introduced Father Burgio, whose theme was the power of a nurse as briefly outlined in the life of Elizabeth Seton.

A WIDOW with five children, Mother Seton suffered social ostracism, disinherence and poverty by her embracing the Catholic faith.

In Baltimore, she opened a school for girls and in so doing planted the seed for the parochial school system in America. Later, she founded the Daughters of Charity at Emmitsburg, Md., a community which now

numbers over 40,000 members who labor zealously throughout the world.

FATHER BURGIO explained the long and arduous task entailed in the process, now being conducted, of Mother Seton's canonization. The most eminent and learned professional men deliberate and question every smallest evidence.

The speaker asked the assembled nurses to build a treasury of merit by little acts of charity, kindness and courtesies that daily present themselves to the nurse, that God may bless Mother Seton with sainthood.

Father Delaunay Known Here, Dies In Portland, Ore.

The Rev. John B. Delaunay, C.S.C., 66, dean of men at the University of Portland and one-time foreign missionary who visited Rochester diocese on several occasions died Feb. 16, 1953 in Providence Hospital, Portland, Oregon.

A missionary in India when Edward Cardinal Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit was Apostolic Delegate to India, Father Delaunay gave mission talks in Rochester and conducted priests' retreats at St. Bernard's Seminary.

SOLENN REQUIEM Mass was offered in Portland by Archbishop Edward D. Howard of Portland in Oregon, in St. Mary's Cathedral. The body was sent to the University of Notre Dame for burial in the Holy Cross community cemetery.

Father Delaunay was born in Paris, France, July 8, 1886, was graduated from the Sorbonne in 1902. The following year he joined the Congregation of Holy Cross and came to the University of Notre Dame.

He received his doctorate in philosophy at the Catholic University of America in 1906 and was ordained in Rome in 1909. He was awarded his doctorate in Canon Law at the Angelicum in Rome in 1911.

From 1922 to 1928, Father Delaunay served as a missionary in Bengal, India. He edited The Bengalee magazine and served on the staff of the Holy Cross Foreign Mission Society in Washington, from 1928 to 1933, when he went to the University of Portland, where he was dean of men and head of the psychology department. He conducted many retreats for clergy in various sections of the country.

Katowice Bishop Confined In Convent

London—(RNS)—Bishop Stanislaw Adamski of Katowice, has been released temporarily from prison and placed under house arrest in a convent at Poznan, it was reported here.

The 77-year-old Roman Catholic prelate was transferred to the convent because of illness, it was said.

Two other Katowice prelates, Coadjutor Bishop Herbert Bednorz and Auxiliary Bishop Julius Bieniek, are still in jail in Polish Silesia, the reports said. All three bishops were arrested last November.

The President suggested a change in the hours to avoid having religious instruction classes, which are optional under Philippine law, taught either before or after regular school hours.

Milwaukee, Wis.—(NC)—Frank M. Bruce, Sr., 67, treasurer and publisher of the Bruce Publishing Company, died (February 22) in Milwaukee Hospital, five days after he had undergone an operation.

A native of Milwaukee, Mr. Bruce was the son of William George and Monica Moehring Bruce. He was an alumnus of Marquette University and the University of Wisconsin. After completing his education, he became an official of the Catholic Publishing firm conducted by his father. He was president of the Milwaukee Metropolitan Council of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and was active in affairs of Serra International.
