

GOD LOVE YOU!

In the words, "foreign missions" conjure up in your mind the idea that "foreigners" are people whom we ought to help after we have helped ourselves; or that they are a "pious extra" to whom we might give our superfluities, after we took care of all our wants?

In the Parable of the Good Samaritan Our Saviour told us that our neighbor is not the one who is close to us, but the one who is far away from the point of view of blood, race and friendship. The Samaritan was a "foreigner" to the Jew as the African to us may be called a "foreigner", but Our Lord defined him as the "neighbor". The neighbor is the one who has eternal resemblance before God; even our enemies have that image. Our Lord also turned upside down our "natural" ideas about loving. We often identify loving with liking, but Our Lord said there was no reward in loving those who liked us. We are to love those whom we never think of liking.

Perhaps the Holy Father had this parable in mind when he said: "Charity to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith exceeds all other charities as heaven earth, and eternity time." His Missions with their 1,100,000,000 pagans are our neighbors of whom God said: "Thou shalt love." The Hindu living on a couch of rice a day, the Chinese coolie slaving for Russian tyrants in Peiping, the Japanese living according to the precepts of Buddha and yet feeling hungry for more intimate communion with God—all these are our neighbors—"Thou shalt love."

Our Lord went so far in revolutionizing our ideas of kindness that He said: "When thou makest a dinner or a supper, call not thy friends, nor thy kinsmen, nor thy neighbors who are rich; lest perhaps they also invite thee again, and a recompense be made to thee. But when thou makest a feast, call the poor, the maimed, the lame and the blind; and thou shalt be blessed, because they have not wherewith to make thee recompense; for recompense shall be made thee at the resurrection of the just." Notice that Our Blessed Lord gives the high sounding name of "feast" to helping those who are not our friends, our relatives, but He indicated that it is not only what we should do, but it is also something far more festive than eating at noon or in the evening with our friends and relatives. If any of you would like to turn your dinners into banquets we have the list of the poor in our World Mission Office. Serve the banquet in their lands not in your homes. A "feast" implies more than a dinner; so helping the lepers, and the pagans who are blind to the light of faith and deaf to the hearings of the word of God implies a sacrifice.

Now after reading this little homily on the word of the Son of God, may the Holy Spirit inspire you to give up something during Lent that you may be blessed and receive recompense. If you have an inspiration out of love of Jesus and Mary, send the missions your sacrifice.

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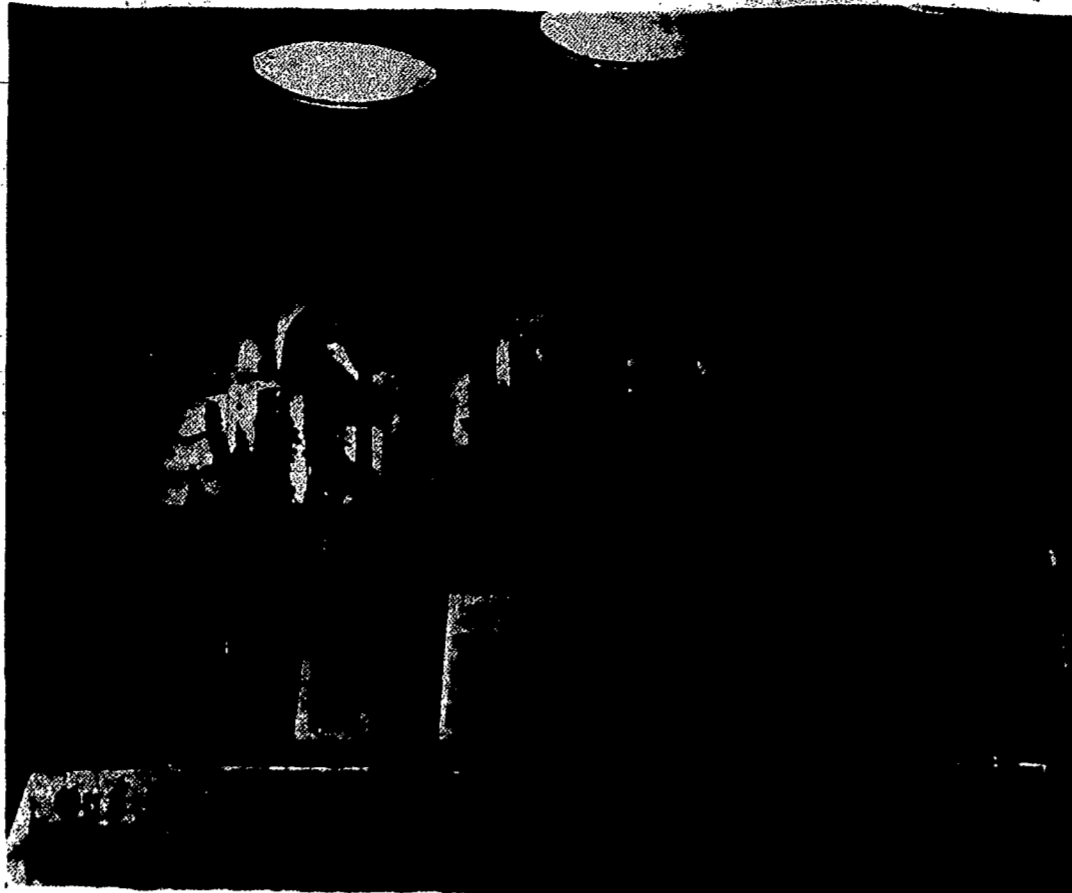
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Shrine To Draw Pilgrims From Here

Visit To Our Lady Shrine Listed In AOH Pilgrimage

To promote greater interest in the Shrine of Our Lady at Knock, County Mayo, Ireland, the New York State Board of the Ancient Order of Hibernians is sponsoring the pilgrimage to the Shrine, along with other Shrines of Europe, scheduled to leave August 14 on the SS America.

THE PILGRIMAGE from this diocese is under the spiritual leadership of the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien, assistant pastor of St. Monica's and state chaplain of the A.O.H.

Speaking on the Shrine, Father O'Brien said, this week: "According to witnesses, the Mother of God along with St. Joseph and St. John appeared at the gable end of the village chapel at Knock, on the evening of August 21, 1879.

"There were 15 witnesses to this first reported apparition and one of them, Patrick Hill describes the phenomenon. As he entered his home after a day of drawing turf from the bog, a neighbor came running to tell of the wondrous lights at the Chapel. There they saw clearly the three figures of Mary, St. John and St. Joseph. Nothing was spoken, and no message was given.

"A SECOND apparition occurred on January 6, 1880 and a third on February 10, 1880, when a large crowd, that had been gathering daily, testified that the chapel was ablaze with light, and in the bright cloud they could see the Mother of God.

Today pilgrims come daily by the thousands and bring their sick and infirm. Knock-too has its wondrous healings.

So far no official word of approval or disapproval has come from the Holy See, though the Archbishop of Tuam has set up in 1935 a medical board of enquiry. It is the prayer of the faithful that some day Knock might rank with the other great Shrines of Mary throughout the world."
