

Scholarship Fund Benefit Show Set By Cathedral CWV Sacred Cantata 'The Life of Christ' Slated By St. Anthony's Youth Choir

A Variety Show for the benefit of their Aquinas Institute Scholarship Fund will be presented by Sacred Heart Cathedral Post, Catholic War Veterans, in the Aquinas Auditorium on Friday, April 7, according to John T. O'Connor, post commander.

The show which will include musical and other acts will be known as the "Studio Frolics of '53."

St. Anthony's Youth Choir will again present "The Life of Christ" in the form of an original Cantata at the Dunn Memorial Auditorium on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings April 11-13.

A matinee for the children will be given on Friday afternoon.

The Cantata follows the life of Christ from the Nativity to the Resurrection, with youngsters in tableaux depicting the various scenes in His life.

A **SPECIAL** tableaux stage is being erected and dramatic lighting arrangements will effect the mode for each of the six outstanding tableaux scenes.

This year's choir will include 100 voices, consisting of children from the fourth through the eighth grades, with alto and bass parts being sung by St. Anthony's high school students.

The children are being trained by Sister Edwina Teresa and Mrs. Mario Forte will be organist. Rev. Albert L. Simonetti, pastor will be conductor for the production and will also train the high school group. Sister Theresa Laurene is in charge of tableaux and Rev. Nicholas P. Alletto will be narrator.

Fr. Riley, Elmira Native, Elevated To Monsignor

Raised to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title Right Reverend Monsignor by Pope Pius XII, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. Riley of Philadelphia is a former Elmira resident.

The appointment was announced last Friday at the office of Archbishop John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., of Philadelphia.

Monsignor Riley is a priest of the Philadelphia archdiocese.

The new Domestic Prelate now 41, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Riley of Philadelphia. He was born in Elmira and attended St. Peter and Paul's School and schools in Mount Morris and Philadelphia. He was ordained to the Holy Priesthood on May 18, 1940 at St. Charles Seminary, Overbrook, Pa.

HIS BROTHER, John Francis Riley, 32 will be ordained at the same seminary on May 31, this year.

Monsignor Riley's first assignment was as chaplain at the Philadelphia General Hospital, and his work has been in that area ever since. He has served as an assistant in the St. Peter and Paul's Cathedral parish and is now director of all Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) activities in the Philadelphia area.

HE IS ALSO a leader of the Blind Guild and chaplain for the Boy Scouts, and was in charge of receiving and placing displaced persons in Philadelphia following World War 2.

His father was toolroom foreman of the Kennedy Valve Mfg. Co. in Elmira for many years and is now an engineer with a Philadelphia manufacturing firm.
