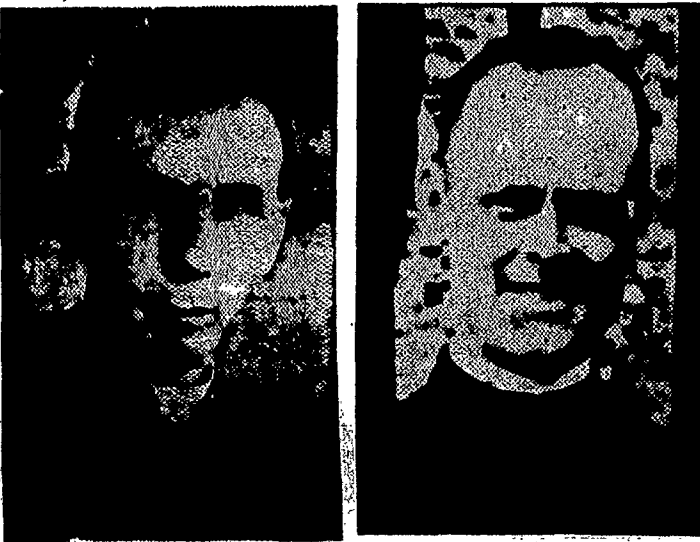


**After Many Years in Far East
Bishop and Father Cleary,
Cousins Meet First Time**



BISHOP CLEARY **FATHER CLEARY**

Boston (N.C.)—Two cousins—one a Bishop and the other a priest, both named Patrick Cleary and both veteran Far East missionaries—met here for the first time.

They had planned a get-together in Shanghai back in 1934, but somehow never got around to keeping the date.

Bishop Patrick Cleary came here on his way home to his native Ireland and met his cousin and namesake, Father Patrick Cleary, a Maryknoller from Ithaca, N. Y. (His sister, Mrs. J. Emmett O'Brien resides in Rochester).

THE BISHOP is a member of the Society of St. Columban. He is Bishop of Nanchang and was expelled from China by the communists shortly before last Christmas. He had been subjected to house arrest for 10 months after he had infuriated the communists by reminding his faithful that all who joined the Red-rigged national church faced excommunication.

Bishop Cleary is a native of Kildare, Ireland. He was ordained in 1911 and after teaching at Maynooth for some years joined the Columban Fathers in 1918. He went to China as a missionary in 1931. He was consecrated a Bishop in 1938.

It was a child's letter written in 1933 that brought the cousins in contact with each other. The letter was addressed simply to "Father Patrick Cleary, China." The efficient Chinese post office at length delivered the letter to the only Father Patrick Cleary known in China. But it turned out to be the wrong one.

When the post office was searched through a U.S. Social Catholic Directory and discovered the whereabouts of a Father Patrick Cleary, Maryknoller in Korea. He forwarded the letter with a note of apology which opened correspondence between them.

It wasn't long before further correspondence developed that the two Fathers Patrick Cleary were cousins. After the planned meeting in Shanghai in 1934 did not materialize, the meeting here was the first opportunity they had to get together.

Between them they have amassed a total of 47 years in the Far East mission field—22 years for Bishop Cleary and 25 years for Father Cleary. Both have high hopes of returning to the Far East.

"WE CAN LOOK upon Charity from two points of view," Bishop Kearney said. "Our generosity can help people less fortunate than ourselves but we can also

see in the poor the Image of Christ.

"Your service to God is exemplified by reason of your being here today," the Bishop continued. "Many in the world would glorify your work but they have lost sight entirely of your point of view. You wear the Crucifix of Jesus Christ, the emblem of the Crusader for Charity.

"We want to serve God in his less fortunate and we can learn to serve the poor by eliminating them from that class." We have promised Our Lord we want to work for his Poor. "Me you have not always with you," Christ said, "but the poor you have always with you, and through the centuries there have always been those who have been dependent on the generosity of human friends," the Bishop said.

"YOU HAVE PUT on the Cross of Christ" the speaker said, "and may God bless your efforts and keep up the same spiritual enthusiasm your organization has had from the beginning.

Miss Frances Battersby, President of the Ladies of Charity, was toastmaster and introduced those seated at the speakers table. Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, Executive Secretary of the organization welcomed the new affiliates and described for them the work of the various committees. Miss Fitzgerald also announced the Affiliation of the local unit with the Ladies of Charity in Paris.

**Contract Awarded
Work Begins On
Cathedral Convent**

With the awarding of the general contract for the new Sacred Heart Cathedral convent to F. Gleason Co., whose bid of \$207,639 was lowest, preliminary work on the convent construction is underway according to the parish bulletin, issued Sunday.

The bulletin prepared by Auxiliary Bishop-elect Lawrence E. Casey, rector of the Cathedral said that the contracts for plumbing and heating and the electrical work will be let shortly to the acceptable bidders.

Not included in the general contract was the steel which was ordered early in February before the contract was awarded to lessen the delay in delivery.

THE STEEL, together with the kitchen equipment, laundry machinery and equipment, chapel decoration and chapel stained-glass windows raises the total of the general contract to \$229,000.

"While the total cost of the Convent completely furnished is not yet known, of one fact we are already certain. It will be considerably over \$300,000," the bulletin said.

"Whatever the convent does cost, it will be a worthwhile investment in the educational future of this parish for generations to come. No luxuries have been included in the convent specifications; on the other hand, when you walk through the new convent on the day of the parish house-warming, you will notice nothing cheap or shoddy.

"We are building, God willing, for the next 50 years or more and we want solid, permanent construction. It is economy in the long run to do things right in the beginning."

WORK ON THE project will begin immediately and the buildings are expected to be ready for occupancy in September, 1954. Mother Helene said. The new school designed by Waasdorp and Northrup, architects, will be built on a 30-acre property, formerly part of the Warren estate, purchased by the Sisters two years ago. The property is east of the entrance to Gleason Valley Park.

Early plans estimated cost of the new four-unit school at \$2 million dollars. Mother Helene said that the religious community received \$250,000 in building funds from the Bishop's Jubilee High School Fund awarded in the diocese last year. Other financing plans were not announced.

The present St. Agnes High School building at 876 Main St. East will continue in use as an elementary school. The building now is operated for 200 pupils, half elementary pupils and half high school.

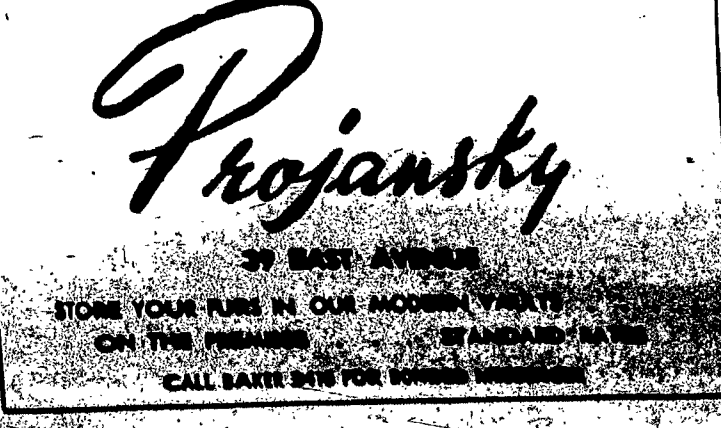

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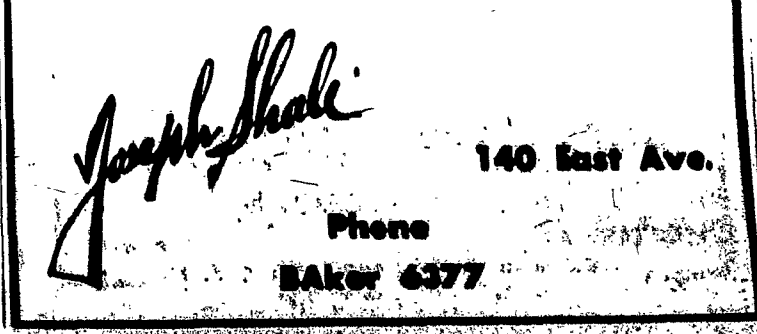


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
