GOD LOVE YOU!

NO one necessarily loses his soul because he has done wrong; he loses it for continuing to do wrong. He is not condemned for falling, but for not getting up; not for walking in the darkness, but for refusing to come to the light.

New think of one billion pagans in the world who are still walking in the darkness of paganism. Of them St. Paul asks: "How shall they know unless they hear of Christ?" Each of us thirty million Catholics in the United States holds a candle that can be reached to the Chinese, the Indians, the Africans, the Malaysians and all people who are as yet walking in darkness. We may not ask with Cain: "Am I my brother's keeper?" To each of us it is given to bring them the light of the Gospel in the measure of the sacrifice we make to the Holy Father for their conversion. If anyone says to us: "Give me a light," we reach a match for the cigarette. When the pagans plead: "Give me the light," say not "I will think it over."

As we rise in the scale of existence, and as our character becomes more Christian, we find ourselves actually choosing sacrifice and pain rather than comfort and ease; and we do it for the love of the thorn-crowned Son of God. A sacrifice of a luxury, or a pleasure for the Holy Father's Missions will force on our attention the thought of why we are here. The musician suffers acute pain when he hears a note that is false; so must we in knowing there is a soul would love Jesus and Mary if we but denied for Him. Others are doing it.

Auto Technology Scholarships Open

Plans to award six scholarships, valued at \$500 each, for study of automotive technology in institutes of the State University of New York were announced today by Dr. Lawrence L. Jarvie, State University executive dean for the institutes.

The scholarships are made possible by the New York State Automobile Dealers, Inc. which last year offered three. "The scholarship program proved so successful," said Dr. Jarvie, "that this year it was doubled."

Recipients of the scholarships will study for two years at the State University Agricultural and Technical Institute at Farmingdale, the Agricultural and Technical Institute at Morrisville, or the Institute of Applied Arts and Sciences at Binghamton. Paid to the winners at the rate of \$250 a year, the scholarship money may be used for such purposes as fees, books, supplies, or board and room.

Qualified graduates of New York State high schools should apply before June 15 to the State University of New York, Albany, 1, N. Y., or through local new car dealers. Winners will be announced after July 1.

Ed Donovan Named St. Bona Cage Coach

St. Bonaventure, N. Y.—Eddie Donovan, a native of Elizabeth, N. J., has been named the new basketball coach at St. Bonaventure University.

He steps into the position formerly held by Ed Melvin whose contract expired March 31 and was not renewed by the Franciscan institution.

Donovan, who will be 30 years of age on June 2, may be the youngest coach in the ranks of major college basketball. In addition to coaching, Donovan will have faculty status.

He played for two seasons under Melvin, 1947-48, and 1948-49, and one under Harry Singleton in 1946-47 at St. Bonaventure. In his senior year, however, Donovan gave up the game as a player and became freshman coach and assistant to Melvin. His freshmen players of that season won 17 of 18 games.

Funerar services for Mrs. John F. Brady of Utica, mother of David B. Brady, head of business education at John Marshall High School and former Public Safety Commissioner of Rochester were held at Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Utica, on Friday.

Mrs. Brady was widely known for her Catholic activities in Utica died unexpectedly April 8, 1953, at her home 21 Prospect St., that city.

A charter member of the Catholic Women's Club and a member of St. Elizabeth Guild in Utica, Mrs. Brady was active in that city from the time she and her husband and children moved from Albany.

She served as vice president of St. Anthony society, a group formed to help foreign born residents adjust themselves to life in this country. She was a "friendly visitor" for the Associated Charities of Utica and one of the pioneers in Community Chest work in that city.

Mrs. Brady helped organize St. Elizabeth Sewing Circle and was one of the first members of the sewing circle of St. Joseph's Infant Home.

Besides her husband, she leaves another son, John F. Jr., Yorkville, and a daughter, Miss Pauline R. Brady, Utica.

Burial was in Mt. Olivet Cemetery, Whitesboro.

Mgr. Boland Stops In Hawaii Enroute To Australia Rites

Honolulu, T. H.—(NC)—Mgr. John P. Boland of Buffalo, who is known in the labor relations field, stopped off here in Honolulu briefly, enroute to the National Eucharistic Congress at Sydney, Australia.

"So-called labor relations," the Mgr. said in an interview, "are human relations. Application of Christian principles to these relations create an atmosphere in which the most difficult problems can be at least adequately solved."

The Monsignor's program of "spiritualizing" labor relations has proven successful in New York, where he has served on a seven-man mediation board since 1946. He recounted that between 10,000 and 12,000 cases involving unfair labor practices have come before the board and that 95 percent of them were settled amicably by the application of Christian principles.

Cardinal Newman London (NC)—A non-Catholic Labor Party member, Dr. Horace King, told the House of Commons that John Henry Cardinal Newman was one of the three outstanding Christian figures of the 19th century.
