Hagerty is a native of Rochester. He will receive a Doctor of Laws Degree.

OTHERS TO receive degrees will be Auxiliary Bishop James F. Flannelly of New York, Very Rev. Laurence J. McGinley, S.J., president of Fordham University, Dr. Maurice J. Costello, Dr. David R. Robinson and George A. Tamm, members of the New York City Board of Education and active in state Knights of Columbus circles.

Hagerty has been with the Metropolitan Life since 1917. He was promoted to treasurer and vice president in 1936 and financial vice president in 1951. In this capacity he has full charge of the purchase of securities for the company.

A Knight of Malta Hagerty is a director of the Erie Railroad, Rochester Gas and Electric Co., L. I. Lighting Co., the East River Savings Bank, National City Bank and Metropolitan Life Insurance Co.

## Minor Approaches Insist On Religion

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## Silver Star Awarded To Army Chaplain

Washington (NC)—The Silver Star for gallantry in action in Korea has been awarded to Father (First Lt.) Daniel Rooney, army chaplain. It has been announced here by the Office of the Chief of Army Chaplains.

A priest of the Institute of Charity community, Father Rooney is a native of New York and joined the army in Urbana, Ill. The citation accompanying his decoration stated that throughout a strong offensive action against an enemy hill while serving with the 1st Battalion, 17th Infantry, last October, Father Rooney completely disregarded his own personal safety as he exposed himself to "withering fire" in going to the aid of wounded.

The citation said he served through the entire action, administering medical and spiritual aid to the wounded and directing their evacuation.

The office also announced the following other decorations: Fathers (Capt.) John T. Calter, Brookline, Mass., and (Capt.) Thomas H. McCarthy, Kansas City, Mo., the Bronze Star, and Father (Capt.) Costanzo J. Antonelli, New York, the Purple Heart for wounds received in North Korea last September 13.

## Koreans Depend On American Aid

Wolfe, Korea (NC)—Funds, clothing and medical supplies donated by American Catholics mean the difference between life and death in this part of Korea, according to a Columbian missionary here.

Father Harold Henry of Northfield, Minn., pro-Prefect of Kwangju, reported there are close to three quarters of a million sick, ragged and hungry refugees in his territory. "We have been able to give considerable help to a multitude of destitute displaced Koreans," he said, thanks to War Relief Service-National Catholic Welfare Conference.

## Malenkov Born In Moslem Faith, Experts Report

When Malenkov took over as Stalin's successor, it was a matter of considerable comment that seemingly nothing was known about his youth. It was recalled that Stalin himself had been a student in a seminary of the Orthodox Church.

Now comes Human Events, a weekly publication of this city, to say that Malenkov comes of Moslem parentage and was raised a Moslem.

Human Events says a book My Uncle Joseph Stalin by Budu Swandize, nephew of the late dictator, describes the new master of the Kremlin as "Malenkov, with his bashkir face . . . the bashkirs were a people of the Ural of Turikh-Alteien origin, a group to which Malenkov's father belonged."

William Henry Chamberlain, a contributor to Human Events and an authority on the Soviet Union, describes the bashkirs as a Mohammedan tribe.

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## Sarsfield Couple Adopts Boy From Dublin Orphanage

Happiness radiated from the small face of 4½ year old Kevin Sarsfield as he stood before U. S. Naturalization examiner John S. Maloney in Elmira last week and realization came to the little lad that he would soon be an American citizen and be able to stay here permanently with his adoptive parents, Mr. and Mrs. John E. Sarsfield, members of St. Patrick's parish.

Kevin was adopted by the Sarsfields two years ago through Catholic Charities of Albany where the family formerly resided. He was obtained from a Catholic orphanage in Dublin, Ireland.

MARY THERESA now three years old has been with the Sarsfield family for a year. She was also placed with the family through Albany Catholic Charities and came from the same Orphanage as Kevin.

The children are extremely happy in their new home where they have been a source of great joy and comfort to their new parents, especially with the fine rich brogue that was a delight to hear.

## 65 Boston College Seniors Take Sampson Cadet Tests

Sampson Air Force Base, N. Y. — Sixty-five Boston College seniors, representing the largest group of students from one school ever to apply for U. S. Air Force flying training en masse, underwent air-cadet qualification testing at Sampson this week in lieu of their regular spring vacations.

Transported to the Central New York indoctrination center early last week by chartered four-engine DC-6 airliner, the students underwent rigid physical and mental examinations prior to preparing to return to Boston Friday afternoon. Those successfully completing the four-day examination will be eligible to commence cadet training shortly after graduation next June.

Departing Monday morning, the group attended a special Mass celebrated by Archbishop Richard J. Cushing, D.D., Boston, in the Our Lady of the Airways Chapel at Boston's Logan International Airport.

THEIR PROGRAM at Sampson was identical to that received by all cadet applicants. Pre-test orientation was received by the potential Air Force officers Tuesday morning and the actual examinations commenced Tuesday afternoon when the group underwent rigid physical observation at the Sampson flight surgeon center.

A day of relaxation was granted to members of the group Wednesday in preparation for mental testing which consumed the remainder of the week.

Included in Thursday's agenda were four hours of written examinations and an afternoon-long psychomotor testing program. Psychomotor testing is designed to measure an applicant's co-ordination and reflex ability — vital factors in determining potential flying training aptitude.

Evaluation of each man's testing was completed Friday morning and the group returned to Boston Friday afternoon. Cadet testing officials have announced plans to expand the program to other colleges throughout the nation as the result of substantial savings in transportation costs effected by processing large groups.

All male high school graduates between the ages of 19 and 26½ are currently eligible for air cadet testing.

## Irish Primate Here, Bound For Australia

New York — (RNS) — Archbishop John C. McQuaid of Dublin, Catholic Primate of Ireland, presided at the Easter Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, in St. Patrick's Cathedral here.

The Irish Primate was Cardinal Spellman's guest during a stop-over while en route to the National Eucharistic Congress in Sydney, Australia to be held April 12-19. From here he flew to San Francisco where he met with Archbishop John J. Mitty.

Archbishop McQuaid will address the Eucharistic Congress on "Educational and Cultural Influences of Europe."
