### High Scholastic Honors Earned By Five Seneca Falls Parish School Graduates

Seneca Falls — Following the announcement that William Sisson would be valedictorian of the graduating class of Mynderse Academy comes the news that he has been offered three scholarships.

Union College has made available an award of \$400 for the year 1963-4 and if Williams' scholastic work is satisfactory, the award will continue through the entire course.

The second and third awards came from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at Troy, N. Y. The first is the Prudential Scholarship for \$500 for the freshman year and if financial assistance is needed in the following years, he is eligible for a limited number of sophomore, junior and senior scholarships and also is eligible to borrow from the school's loan fund.

The third award is a \$1200 grant from the Syracuse Alumni Committee for four years at Rensselaer. The money is to be used at the rate of \$300 per annum on tuition expenses.

The University of Rochester has also awarded William a scholarship of \$500 per year on the basis of his high school records. He has made no decision as to which he will accept.

William, a graduate of St. Patrick's School, has set an all-time scholastic record by attaining a general average of 91.63%, the highest ever recorded at Mynderse Academy, exceeding by a narrow margin that set by Miss Anita Palumbo, the former champion.

He is co-editor-in-chief of the Mynderse Microphone, the school paper, also, a Junior Rotarian, a member of the Science Club, a member of the Mynderse Year Book staff, a member of the Block M Club; has been active with the Latin Club, play committees, intramurals and Student Council.

Kevin has been offered a \$400 scholarship from the college of arts and sciences, University of Rochester, but has made no definite decision on his future education.

OTHER HONOR students in the "Top ten" of the graduating class for '63 are Leon Bolich, son of Leon Bolich and the late Mrs. Cecelia Bolich, who attained an average of 92.66%. Leon has been senior class treasurer, Junior Rotarian and the Mynderse sports editor. He has been active in Glee Club, the Band, the Microphone, plays and attended Boys' State. Leon is a graduate of St. Patrick's School.

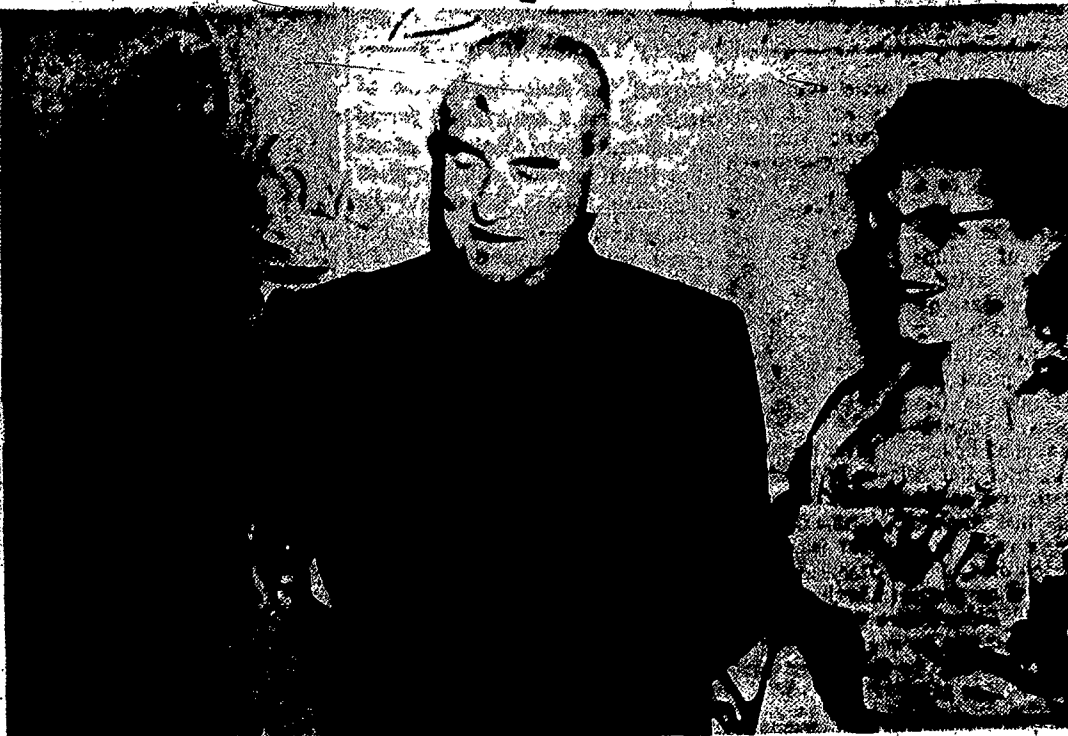
Next in line is Miss Shirley Stapleton, also a member of St. Patrick's parish. Shirley earned a general average of 92.62%. She is the Microphone news editor, and has been active in various clubs and committees.

She was offered a scholarship by Nazareth College after participating in the competitive examinations in March. She has also been awarded a University of Rochester scholarship.

Marie Sullivan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Sullivan, of the Lake Road, stood eighth in the list of Honor Students and John Cameron, Fraser, son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Fraser, of W. Fall St., was ninth. Cameron is a graduate of St. Patrick's School.

The graduating class has 106 members and a large portion of the group plan to go further in school.

### Bishop Urges Women's Club To Promote Faith, Good

Women should play a leading role in their communities in fostering belief in moral principles as expressed in "dogmatic belief" in Christ's teachings, His Excellency Bishop Kearney told members of the Catholic Women's Club on April 15.

The Bishop, spiritual director of the women's organization, spoke at a dinner honoring him at the Rochester Club attended by 175 Catholic women. It was the 16th consecutive dinner at which Bishop Kearney has attended.

PRESENTED BY Mrs. Edward L. Zimmer, dinner chairman, the Bishop cited the widely publicized case of "a young slayer of five persons" as an example of modern society's failure to teach the young to have a sense of conscience.

The killer, Bishop Kearney declared, "had no concept of right or wrong or what conscience means. I wonder how long that can go on in a country, without the country ceasing to exist?" he asked.

The women were told it is their responsibility to foster good in the community through steadfast adherence to the principles of "absolute truth" and faith in God.

Noting that Christ referred to freedom only once — when He told his Apostles, "You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free" — the Bishop said that the modern man, "who allows himself to be buffeted in and fro by current philosophy is not free: He is lost."

### GOD LOVE YOU!

PRAYERS form the major part of most people's prayers, and they are pleading to God for help. "Ask and you shall receive." But petition must be also for two other blessings: forgiveness and strength to repair the harm we have done. We sin and we must atone. But is the slight penance given after confession really atonement? Forgiveness of sin is one thing, but reparation for the fault is quite another. Sinning is like driving nails into a wall; being forgiven is like pulling them out ... but the holes still remain. Reparation and atonement plugs up those holes.

It is not just the breaking of a law on the traffic laws are broken by speeding. It is the crossing of the bonds between the Father and us, as when the prodigal son left the father's home. We never feel very sorry when we break a traffic law, but we do feel sorrow at hurting the feelings of one we love. Forgiveness restores that union with God, and that is why we feel so good after confession.

If we steal a watch we not only ask to be forgiven, but we also return the watch. To forgiveness therefore, is to be added reparation or penance and the complete atonement or at-one-ment with God.

But there is a further consideration at this point—inasmuch as our sin diminished the love of God, it follows that the best way to atone for the sin is to do something to spread the love of God in the world, to make others love because we failed, to increase other's faith because ours weakened, to establish new bonds with the Father because we ruptured ours.
