

## Help Needed By India, Prelates Warn

Delhi, April 23.—(RNS)—A warning that India needs the aid of other countries if it is to avoid the threat of Communism was issued by Indian Roman Catholic prelates attending the National Eucharistic Congress here.

At a symposium on the East and West, and the future of Asia, Archbishop of Bombay, said that his country "needs the help of Australia and other countries if it is to develop in the way it should and also if it is to be kept free of the Communist menace."

ON THE same theme, Archbishop Joseph A. Fernandes of Delhi and Simla asserted that the average Indian has no real interest in Communism but is attracted by Communist promises. "In the different period of famine," he said, "the average Indian would be delighted to take help from the Devil, if necessary," adding that he was certain there would be "no Communism in India if the needs of the people are met."

Archbishop Fernandes said reports of Communist progress in India had been exaggerated and that the large Communist vote recorded in the last national elections was simply a vote against the government Congress Party.

## Stevenson Predicts Defeat For Reds In Indo-China

Saigon, Vietnam.—(NC)—The communists will lose the war in Indo-China.

So predicted Adlai E. Stevenson, 1952 Democratic candidate for President of the United States, after completing a week's tour of the country.

Mr. Stevenson also declared in an interview here that only Moscow can order a Red invasion of Vietnam. A truce in Korea, he said, will not provoke it.

HE FRAMED the role played in the war by Vietnamese troops and emphasized the importance to America of defeating the communist attempt to conquer Southeast Asia.

During his stay here, Mr. Stevenson visited Hanoi and Haiphong, the main ports of the country, and was welcomed by the leaders of the National Front, including Chief of State, Ho Chi Minh and High President, Nguyen Dinh Diem.

The Most Rev. James A. McNulty, Auxiliary Bishop of Newark, has been named Bishop of Paterson, N. J., by Pope Pius XII. Born in New York City in 1894, Bishop McNulty was educated at Seton Hall College, South Orange, N. J., and Louvain University, Belgium. He was ordained in 1923 and consecrated Titular Bishop of Methone and Auxiliary of Newark on Oct. 7, 1947. Bishop McNulty is Moderator of the National Federation of Catholic College Students, which is under the direction of the Youth Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

## 'Little Mo' Hopes To See Holy Father

San Diego.—(NC)—Maureen Connolly—the "Little Mo" of tennis—plans to accomplish two goals this Summer.

She hopes to visit the Holy Father in Rome and also to see her sights on becoming the first woman in history to capture the Australian, French, British and American tennis championships in the same year.

SEE CONFIDED her tennis "grand slam" hopes to Charles G. Johnson, sports editor of Tidings, Los Angeles, Archdiocesan newspaper. "And don't call 'Little Mo' short," commented Mr. Johnson. "She's just the girl who can do it."

The 15-year-old tennis champion will make her first tournament appearance in Rome on May 5. Until then, she'll continue as a part-time student at the San Diego College for Women, conducted by the Religious of the Sacred Heart.

THE SISTERS report that "Queen Maureen" remains unsophisticated and popular with her schoolmates, although she was just one jump behind Queen Elizabeth and Marie Eisenhower in the 1953 Associated Press "Woman of the Year" poll.

## It's 'Comrade Mama' In Czechoslovakia

Rome.—(Radio, NC)—It's "Comrade Mama" and "Comrade Papa" now in some parts of communist-dominated Czechoslovakia, according to reports received here by the Veritas Press Agency.

One report from Brno, in Moravia, said that for children from six to 14, the expression "Comrade" has been introduced for their schoolmates, their teachers, and even their parents. Teachers themselves address the youngsters as "Comrades."

According to other reports received by Veritas, there have been demonstrations of protest in central Moravia by parents because of being addressed by their own children in this typical communist manner.

## Procession On River Planned At Exhibit

St. Louis, Mo.—(RNS)—A religious procession of rivercraft on the Mississippi will be a highlight of the World Mission Exhibition here, May 17-21.

The exhibition will portray the work of 175 Catholic missionary societies which operate in 613 areas throughout the world.

The river parade, comprising some 50 vessels of various sizes, will escort a 200-year-old statue of the Blessed Virgin, Queen of the Missions. The statue was rescued from an early mission at Kaskaskia, Ill., and has been exhibited in recent years at St. Louis University.

## World Awaits Russia's Answer To Peace Bid

Western leaders continued this week to speculate on what reply Moscow would make to the key questions set forth in the historic appeal for peace voiced by President Eisenhower on behalf of the free world.

Whatever the reply may be, there seemed no doubt that the President had achieved his main objective of putting the Soviet government in a situation where it must show by deeds that its "peace offensive" is really sincere.

WHAT Mr. Eisenhower wanted to know was, in brief: Is Russia prepared to use its influence in the communist world to bring genuine peace in Asia to allow nations now under Soviet domination a free choice of government and to cooperate in world disarmament?

Mr. Eisenhower's appeal was embodied in a speech—hailed by British Prime Minister Winston Churchill as "massive and magnificent"—before the American Society of Newspaper Editors just at the moment when sick and wounded prisoners were being exchanged in Korea.

HE CHALLENGED the Russians to tell the world whether it wants to continue the devious and treacherous policies of Stalin. Speaking to the leaders of Western Europe, he appealed for the unification of Germany and the creation of a strong and unified European community. Clearly echoing the sentiments of the American people—as evidenced by the almost unanimous approval of his speech by both parties in the Congress—President Eisenhower called for an honorable armistice in Korea leading to a political conference with a view to the reunification of Korea on the basis of free elections.

He said an armistice in Korea must be accompanied by an end also to communist attacks on Indo-China and Malaya.

ALSO, HE added, Moscow must show its good intentions by ceasing to block a peace treaty with Austria and by releasing the thousands of prisoners still held in Russia since the last war.

Balancing these stiff political stipulations for a general settlement of East-West differences was President Eisenhower's generous offer of economic concessions if the terms are met.

## Catholic President? Chances 'Slim Indeed', Survey Shows

St. Paul, Minn., April 17.—(NC)—The chances of a Catholic moving into the White House are "slim indeed," according to a nationwide survey by The Catholic Digest.

The Digest survey revealed that over half the U. S. Protestants and three and one-half million Jews (31 per cent) would not vote for a Catholic as President of the U. S.

At the time, 92 per cent of American Catholics said they would vote for a Protestant for President and 57 per cent said they would also vote for a Jew for President.

Protestants are less willing to send a Jew to the White House, the Digest reported. Only 31 per cent of the Protestants said that they would be willing to vote for a Jewish candidate and 61 per cent admitted frankly that they would not.

The Digest article included no figures on how many Catholics would like to see a Catholic president in office at this time.
